Death Recalls Historic Relics Of Geddie Family

Many people in New London learned with much regret of the death of Miss Christine Fraser of Alberton which occurred a short time ago. About three years ago the late Miss Fraser and her brother, Rev. J. K. Fraser donated some very interesting relics which had belonged to Rev. John Geddie to the Geddie Memorial Church. Included in these was a picture of Mrs. Geddie and three of her family, the picture was clear but yellowed with age. Another was a sample of cloth worn by the women of the South Sea Islands where the Geddie went as missionaries. This cloth was made from the leaves of trees which they first chewed up and finally made into a fabric which is still today after so many years strong and hard to tear. It was made in a striped pattern in color of brown and gold and a light straw color. Another article was a war club such as was used to kill the Gordons on the island of Eromonga. This club is a little less than three feet long, made of a heavy, almost black wood with knobbed carved head. It was brought to Rev. Allan Fraser, Miss Fraser's father by Dr. Geddie when he came back to Canada on furlough in 1864.

The story is told that one dark stormy night one of the natives followed Rev. Mr. Geddie through the jungle with one of those clubs (perhaps the same one), with the intention of killing him. As he raised his arm to strike it suddenly became paralyzed and he never after regained full use of it. He afterwards converted and told the story with his own lips.

A few months ago Miss Price of Charlottetown kindly donated an autographed framed picture of Rev. Mr. Geddie. This has been placed with the collection in the church and makes a complete set of the Geddie family.

The collection of Geddie relics in the old church is without doubt the best in Canada. The first secured was the old pewter Communion Set which has engraved on it the words and date "N. L. Presbyterian Congregation 1832."

When the island was surveyed by Captain Holland in 1764 he divided it into thirteen parishes. New London Parish comprised Lots 21 and 22. The first Presbyterian Church in this parish was built of logs near New London harbour. The spot is marked by an old cemetery which can be seen there today. The minister was Rev. Hugh Dunbar and the old Communion Set was the one he used as the building of what is now known as "Geddie Memorial Church" was not commenced until 1836.

The old deed written on parchment was also secured. This deed conveyed a grant of land from Alexander Anderson for church grounds and for the first cemetery. Later some of the old "tokens" were added. They are made of pewter, quite thin, about one inch square, and bear the same date as the Communion service.

The late Mrs. Albert Simpson gave a framed copy of Dr. Geddie's farewell address delivered in the church more than a century ago. The late A. S. McKay and Mrs. MacKay presented a nicely bound "Life of Rev. John Geddie, D. D."

A few years ago Mr. and Mrs. Webb of Cavendish gave two chairs which had been used by the Geddie family in their own home. In the passing of Miss Fraser one more link with the past has been broken.
