PREMIER LEA

In 1927, established a claim on behalf of this Province for a total subsidy of \$1,249,655.10; that in view of the adoption by Canada in the case of the Western Provinces of the principle above mentioned, namely that of granting arrears in subsidy, our claim is now for a subsidy of \$3,372,166.57, made up as follows: Debt allowance, \$1,342,672.87; per

capita increase re assumed population, \$187,639.76; public lands, \$1,613,453.94; Government administration subsidy, \$100,000; our share of the Fisheries award, \$50,000; damages for non-fulfillment of terms, \$78,400. Then comes the following statement:

"In addition to the above claims for a subsidy in future of \$3,372,166 there is also a claim for a cash settlement as follows: DAMAGES ARISING FROM EXPROPRIATION OF SANATORIUM, \$100,000."

His Own Statement

What do you think of that, Mr. Speaker? Over his own signature last year he makes the statement that there is a claim for damages arising from the expropriation of the Sanatorium, \$100,000. (Loud applause).

The Premier is the last witness that I shall put on the stand. I HAVE PROVED THE CASE OUT OF HIS OWN MOUTH, WITH HIS OWN SIGNATURE. (Applause). Just one year ago, in the absence of the then Premier, Mr. Saunders, he, as Acting Premier of the Province, taking the full authority of the Government, puts forth this claim in which he says there is a claim against the Dominion for \$100,000, for damages for expropriation of the Dalton Sanatorium. WHO IS RIGHT NOW? (Applause). (Premier Lea did not reply.)

In Black And White

Isn't there something in the claim? Isn't the admission of mismanagement as evident as it can be? ISN'T IT THERE IN BLACK AND WHITE, with the full authority of the then Acting Premier of the Province, now the leader of this House? I say that through mismanagement, and through HIS mismanagement, we have suffered the loss of \$100,000, and every one in this Chamber and many people throughout the length and breadth of this Province had to go down into their pockets and make up that loss.

PREMIER LEA: Do you believe what you are saying?

DR. MCMILLAN: Do I believe it? Yes. I believe it, the Province believes it, AND YOU BELIEVE IT TOO! (Applause).

PREMIER LEA: Campaign stuff! DR. MCMILLAN: He denies his own written statement! (Applause). WHICH WILL YOU TAKE? Will you take his word, or his written statement? They say a man's word is as good as his bond. HERE IS HIS BOND; IS HIS WORD ANY BETTER? YOU CAN TAKE IT OR LEAVE IT. (Applause).

PREMIER LEA: That does not admit anything. You include all the claims you like, if you are trying to make a case. You say there is a claim; surely it was no harm to include it?

HON. MR. LEPAGE: On one hand you are claiming that we didn't make a claim and on the other hand you are claiming that we did make a claim.

DR. MCMILLAN: Logic from the wonderful light that comes from Rustico! It is not our claim that I am referring to; it is YOUR claim. It is right there in the Patriot, the "gospel of truth." You cannot deny your own gospel, can you? Haven't we a perfect right to say the claim was there, and always has been there?

PREMIER LEA: Why didn't you say something about that when the report was made? The report of the Commission was tabled and it was eight years before you discovered that. Why didn't you say that then? DR. MCMILLAN: I was not here to say it.

PREMIER LEA: Why didn't your party say it? Why did you wait till the campaign?

DR. MCMILLAN: I didn't wait till the campaign.

PREMIER LEA: Why didn't you press it when you came into power?

DR. MCMILLAN: You destroyed the legal claim when you dismantled the institution.

PREMIER LEA: We only intensified it. Why didn't you try it?

DR. MCMILLAN: The man who bungled the job was the man to press it! (Applause).

PREMIER LEA: That is for political capital.

DR. MCMILLAN: It is a fact.

PREMIER LEA: It is your idea of the fact.

DR. MCMILLAN: It is evidence out of your own mouth. (Applause).

PREMIER LEA: Why didn't you get that when the Commission came home; it was eight years ago.

DR. MCMILLAN: We were not in power when the Commission came home. The evidence is that you were there, and surely, if you had been good enough, you would have got the case settled.

PREMIER LEA: They never mentioned the fact.

DR. MCMILLAN: I have it out of the mouths of those who were present.

PREMIER LEA: Read their report; it is not in their statement.

DR. MCMILLAN: But it is in your own statement, given out under your authority as Acting Premier of the Province. That is the point, and I say that every man, woman and child in this Province was penalized on account of someone's mismanagement.

PREMIER LEA: Not mine.

Disgraceful Episode

DR. MCMILLAN: You were the delegated representative of the Government at that conference. You were the Secretary-Treasurer and financial custodian of the Province at the time. My hon. friend says now this criticism is made to injure

him politically. WHO CARES ABOUT HIM POLITICALLY? He must think he is a wonderful man, if injuring him politically is going to do any one any good. I care more about the tuberculous sufferers of this Province, and I may tell the Premier that I would not like to have the responsibility which he must shoulder now! We do not know how many men, women and children have gone to their graves who might be living today if that institution had been kept open. (Applause) That is the serious part of it, when you come to deal with human life. It is the most disgraceful episode in the history of this Province, from beginning to end from the time it was instituted by those men who say now that this Government has done more for public health than any Government since Confederation. I SAY THAT CERTAIN MEMBERS OF THE GOVERNMENT HAVE DONE MORE TO INJURE PUBLIC HEALTH THAN ANY ONE SINCE CONFEDERATION. (Applause).

First Things First

We hope that the new Provincial Sanatorium will do some good, even at this late date. The medical men of this Province have been waiting for it for years, and so far as we on this side of the House are concerned, our conscience is clear. We have been solicitous for public health. The only reason why I stay in politics as a representative of this splendid city is because I may be able to do some good for public health in this Province. I will stand on my record and I will put that record against the record of Holstein cattle, or gravelled roads, or Prohibition or anything else; because I know something of the evils and the results of disease. I know, too, that the Red Cross Society has done more good work in this Province in the treatment of crippled children than the Lea Government has done or can do if they remained in office for a thousand years.

It has been said that we are not making progress in public health. Thank God we are; and those who are in the fight for public health are looking forward to accomplishing greater things in the future. So far as this Government has helped in this endeavour, I am prepared to give it all the credit it deserves. But I will never submit to seeing public health or education take a back seat to gravelled roads or Holstein cattle or anything else that pertains to the merely material life of the Province. (Applause).
