SKINNER'S POND MAN FOUND DEAD NEAR HIGHWAY

May Be Coldest Day This Winter

The temperature this morning may be setting a new low mark for this winter. At 2 A.M. today the unofficial reading in Charlottetown was 15 below zero.

SAINT JOHN, N. B., Feb. 9.—(CP)—Workmen today started to clear the site for construction of a new \$1,100,000 passenger and immigration shed to replace one destroyed in a fire which raged through the West Saint John waterfront in 1931.

Death Occurred In Snow Storm Sunday Night

The body of Benjamin Perry of Skinner's Pond was found beside a highway two miles west of Tignish yesterday. It was believed the man perished Sunday night.

Mr. Perry, about 30 years old, left Skinner's Pond about 6:30 Sunday night in a snow storm of near-blizzard proportions to return to his wife and two children at Kildare Capes, some nine miles away.

Travelers found his horse and left abandoned about two hours later on three miles from Skinner's Pond but the weather was stormy and nothing was seen of Mr. Perry. Apparently the person finding the sleigh did not suspect the driver was in the vicinity.

The horse was taken to Tignish, it was reported.

An inquest was ordered yesterday afternoon and members of the R.C.M.P. and a coroner left Alberton for the district where the body was found. They started by automobile, preceded by a snow plow, but late last night had not reached Tignish. It was expected they would transfer to a sleigh there.

It was reported that the horse when found was in a heavy drift and had one shoe caught in a wire fence. Residents of the area believed Mr. Perry had missed a turn to a winter road through fields and had driven into the fence. One shaft of the sleigh was broken.

The body was only a few yards from the fence and was quite close to the sleigh. One report said it was 30 feet off the road. There was no hat on the body and there were traces of blood on the head. However, the latter condition was believed to have been caused by the action of frost. Blood was also reported to have been noticed on a mitt found near the body.

The body was found at 1 o'clock yesterday. It was almost completely covered by snow. A Perry boy, 13 to 14 years old and son of Mr. and Mrs. Edmund Perry of Ascension found the body.

Mr. Perry was a fisherman but was living at Kildare Capes for the winter. He went Sunday to inspect his house at Skinner's Pond. It was reported that he was blind in one eye. Persons finding the body said they noticed his eye glasses were missing.

The weather was very stormy shortly after the left Skinner's Pond and during the night the temperature dropped below zero.
