THE BEET SUGAR INDUSTRY FOR PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND.

Bulletin IX of the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa recalls attention to the beet sugar industry, once dis-

It is claimed that our soil is admirably adapted for the growth of the sugar beet at its best; that the farmers' profit annually is greater and more regular than in any crop we now produce; that the refuse pulp as cake after the sugar is extracted is valuable for milch cows, sheep and all other farm stock; that men owning farms valued at \$80 per acre in Ontario give testimony that they would not continue farming but for the beet industry.

A valued correspondent declares, after reading the evidence of hundreds of farmers detailed in the bulletin referred to,—farmers who grow beets or sugar factories—that this industry might be conducted with great and unusual profits here. One factory presumably in Charlottetown, could handle all the beets grown in this Province. Six miles from the railway, and a rail distance of ninety miles from the city could be profitably covered.

The bulletin in question is both interesting and instructive and it would be well worth while for all who are interested to obtain a copy. Clearly we want more factories and some development of new methods and new products in our agricultural industry if we are to make reasonable progress.

POSSIBILITIES OF THE DAY LIGHT SAVING SCHEME.

Whether putting the clocks and watches ahead one hour or more in April, and reverting the time in September would be a wise or an unwise thing is a subject upon which different persons may honestly hold opposite opinions, or may reasonably change their opinions, if they get additional light thereon. It seems that notwithstanding the views expressed in this column some days ago, there are a number of persons who believe in the possibility of saving, daylight, cutting down gas and electric light bills and generally getting more efficiency in work and more good out of life by setting the clocks ahead during the five warmer and brighter months of the year. And it seems only fair that their view of the case should be set forth.

The morning the time should be advanced one hour, and put back to the old style again on the third Sunday in September.

Then, they added, the work of farmers, gardeners, sailors and others whose work is already regulated by daylight, and that of miners, which is regulated by shifts, would remain unaffected and unprejudiced by the proposals of the bill.

Firstly then as a matter of history, it appears to be true that when Mr. Willet's bill was first introduced in the British Parliament it was treated as a joke, a mere effort to secure freak legislation. But he persevered and advanced arguments sufficiently weighty to have the bill referred to a committee. And then the unexpected happened. Many witnesses being examined, it was found that the proposal commended itself to employers, working men, scientists and social reformers generally. So cogently indeed was the case presented that the committee endorsed it and reported in its favor. They proposed but one change, from 80 minutes as proposed to 60 minutes—that on the third Sunday in April at two o'clock in

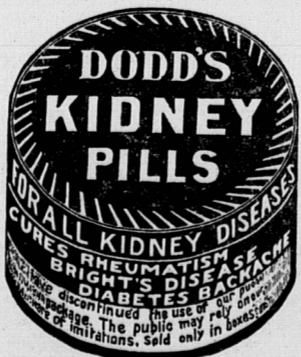

Both parties have made their nomination of candidates for the first district of Queens, made vacant by the death of Hon Matthew Smith. The Conservative nomination has fallen to John Myers of Crapaud, while Cyrus Crosby of Bonshaw will be the Liberal standard-bearer. Both are good men and well known in the district. The fact that the district returned one representative of each party at the general election indicates a fairly close division of political sentiment. The late lamented Speaker was also an exceptionally popular man. There is a rumor, not officially confirmed that the by-election may not be held till June, when better roads would facilitate the canvass.

The death is announced of Senator Gowan of Barrie, Ont. in the 94th year of his age. He was born in Ireland in 1815, came to Canada in 1832 and was called to the bar in 1839. He was for some time a county court judge but retired and was appointed to the Senate in 1885 by the Conservative Government of that time. He was an intimate friend of the late Sir John Macdonald, with whom he had great influence, and also a close friend of the late Sir John Thompson.
