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**Mr. McKenzie King At Parsley Meeting**

PAISLEY, ONT., Aug. 13.—Hon. MacKenzie King was the chief speaker at a mass meeting of Bruce County Liberals at Paisley, beautiful Riverside Park yesterday afternoon. He devoted considerable time replying to Premier Meighen's address at Stirling yesterday. He scored the Premier's attitude toward the country at large as autocratic and lofty, picturing him walking down the middle highway ignoring those on either side. "I am reminded of the Parisee who kept the middle road without allowing his garments to be touched by suffering humanity. There was another figure in that parable and if Mr. Meighen wishes to play the roll of the Pharisee I am content as party leader to take the part of the blind men, and better the conditions of humanity."

**L.O.O.F. Grand Lodge**

The Grand Lodge L.O.O.F. of the Maritime Provinces has concluded its sessions at Sackville. The Charlottetown members who attended returned Thursday with the exception of Mr. Murdoch Ross who went to Sydney on a visit. The meetings were very successful and about 250 delegates were in attendance. Very satisfactory reports were submitted. The Grand Master, P. A. McGowan in his report of the Order said that there was an awakening over the jurisdiction of judges and members.

The Grand Secretary Mr. J. J. McKinnon of Charlottetown in his report said:

"The year has been by far the best in our history both numerically and financially. Our net gain in membership being 1128 making our membership on June 30th, 13,524 while the cash assets have increased \$24,857.72 and the total assets \$26,232.27; these figures are exclusive of three new lodges which were instituted July and from which no returns have been received. It is worthy of note, that the loss from suspensions for non-payment of dues is the smallest for years being only 244 as against 384 during the previous year.

The annual report of the Registrar shows that the number of lodges as 73, the total membership 7,332, a gain of 1134 during the year. There are 126 subordinate lodges with a total membership of 13,524.

The Grand Treasurer of the Grand Lodge reports that the balance to the credit of the Lodge is \$13,314.33. For next year the receipts are estimated at \$12,760 and the expenditures at \$9,100. The amount to the credit of the Home Fund is now \$28,934.02.

WHY MR. MCKENZIE KING DECLINED NOMINATION

TORONTO, Aug. 10.—That R. W. E. Burnaby, U. F. O. candidate in North York, against Hon. W. L. MacKenzie King, Liberal leader, should withdraw from the field was the assertion made by Mr. King, speaking at a gathering at Oak Ridge, near here. "If they get the U. F. O. and Liberals and other parties fighting throughout the country, then the Union government will have a chance," he declared, "and if they are elected again, they might carry on for another generation. I think the first thing to do is to defeat the government."

Mr. King explained that he had declined a nomination in Glenora because he wished to leave the field open to a farmer candidate. Mr. Burnaby himself was present at the meeting and afterwards spoke to Mr. King, but he did not state whether or not he would withdraw.

PARIS, Aug. 12.—The French government has decided to recognize General Wrangel as head of the government in south Russia. Two reasons given by the foreign office for recognizing General Wrangel are first, his promise to assume all obligations of the former Russian government.

Second, his promise to give Russia a democratic government. France notified Lloyd-George yesterday of her action to this effect. It is stated, "The French government likewise notifying commercial attaches to London to have no dealings with Leonid Krassin or Leo Kameneff, Soviet emissaries to the British capital."

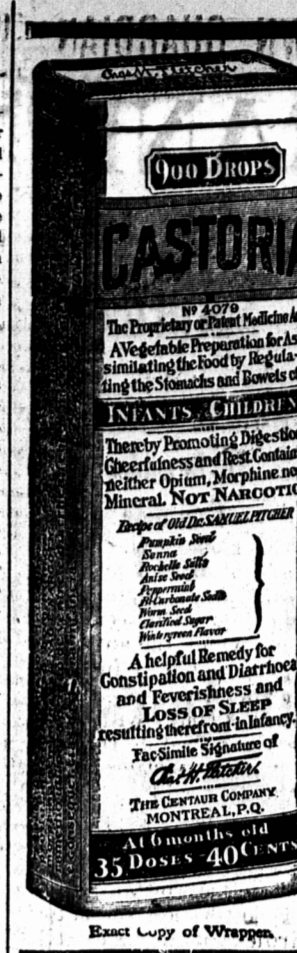
**New Bayer Studio On Great George St.**

Handsome new offices have recently been opened up in the Bayer building, Great George Street, and are attracting enthusiastic comment from all who visit them. The entire building has within the past few months been remodelled and repainted. The old English stucco work on the outside presents a beautiful front, and is in keeping with the artistic finish on the interior.

The new studio of Mr. J. A. S. Bayer, photographer, occupies a considerable portion of the building. Its fittings throughout are a credit to the masterly workmen employed. The reception room is finished in Douglas fir, stained a mission brown with walls tinted Naples yellow. Flooring and stairs are of hardwood, neatly finished, with stairway softly lighted by leaded windows. There are two commodious dressing rooms, containing full length mirrors, and one with running water. Upstairs is the operating room, lighted from a single slant, and so tastefully furnished that it presents the appearance of a nice living room—a room where kiddies would be thoroughly at home, and quite forgetful of the huge camera lurking in the corner—a camera of the latest type, equipped with patent curtain slide holders carrying twelve slides. A feature of the operating room is the beautiful stained glass windows and window-seats upholstered in blue. The changing room (off the operating room) contains a dumb waiter for carrying the plates. Downstairs, at the rear of the building, is the workroom. This is advantageously arranged to get the North light, and is fitted out with expensive photographing apparatus of the latest kind. There is an electric press for dry-mounting prints, an enlarging apparatus using a 500 candle power light, and retouching desks lighted by North light. Reception room, work room, and operating room are connected by telephone. Adjoining the workroom are three dark-rooms, one for developing negatives, another for developing papers, and the third the enlarging room. These can be altered easily to make on large dark-room.

The new offices of Dr. C. C. Archibald, Eye, Ear, Nose, and Throat Specialist, are located in the opposite end of the building, and their interior has been built upon the same artistic lines. Dr. Archibald's reception room is finished in Douglas fir, stained mission brown, cogily furnished and with an open fire place. The operating room is in white enamel, with polished hardwood floor. It is equipped with expensive surgical apparatus, in which the latest electrical appliances play a large part. The operating room is for the lighter cases only, the more serious ones being taken to hospital.
