HOCKEY CHAMPIONSHIP NOT DECIDED

A meeting of the Prince Edward Island Hockey League was held last evening to consider the question in dispute between the Crystals of Summerside and the Victorias of Charlottetown.

A game scheduled to be played in Summerside on February 23rd did not take place as the teams could not agree on officials.

As the rule is when two teams fail to agree on officials the President of the League, Mr. L. McNeill, Summerside, was asked to appoint two officials from non-competing clubs. The President, accordingly appointed two men, one from Summerside and one from Charlottetown. The Victorias objected to the Summerside man claiming he was a Crystal and refused to go to Summerside. The Crystals contended that he was not a member of their club. They went on the ice with the officials the President named, shot a goal and claimed the game.

Both clubs which were represented at the meeting, admitted there had been a misunderstanding. The Crystals, however, did not see why they should lose the game and stated positively that they were through with hockey for the season. The Victorias offered to go to Summerside and play the game with two referees from non-competing clubs in Charlottetown. The Crystals refused this offer.

The decision of the League was that the game was not played and that therefore the scheduled playoffs are completed and the championship not decided.

The trophy will be handed over to the League.

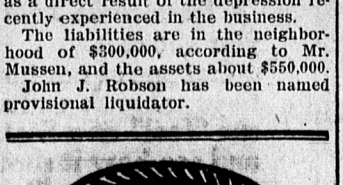

Between four and five hundred people witnessed the second hockey match of the Charlottetown Railway team against the Alberton Regals on Friday night last in the Alberton Arena. The ice was in excellent condition and the game was fast and exciting from start to finish.

Lord Hastings Jr. is one of the coming ones and will make the best of them step next winter.

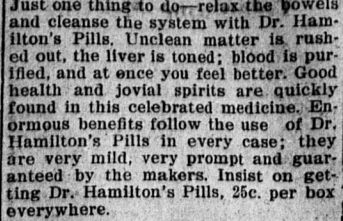
