COMMISSIONERS LEAVE.—Most of the members of the Dominions Royal Trade Commission who recently were in Charlottetown in the pursuance of their work will be leaving Canada this week for the Old Country, their labors prematurely concluded on account of the war. They will sail by the liner, Royal George.

PREMIER ASQUITH'S SPEECH.—On page nine of to-day's issue will be found the full report of the speech made by the Prime Minister, the Rt. Hon. Mr. Asquith, to the House of Commons in moving the vote of credit of £100,000,000 for the purposes of Britain's participation in the European war. Mr. Asquith's speech was an eloquent effort that stirred patriotic feelings in the heart of every man who listened to him.

A RUNAWAY HORSE.—Yesterday morning quite a lot of excitement took place when a horse owned by a gentleman from the Mainland became frightened and ran at a rapid pace up Queen street and along Grafton. When in front of Sanderson & Co.'s store the carriage collided with another and bounced into the air causing the horse to turn a somersault and land right upon the sidewalk. The animal received a deep cut on the foot but the carriage was only slightly damaged.

COURT OF CHANCERY.—The Vice Chancellor yesterday morning heard another witness in the case of Baker v. Donovan and others which was heard before him some weeks ago. This case was instituted by a boy for a share in certain foxes captured at St. Peter's by Donovan, Turner and Morrison, the boy claiming that he was a partner in the expedition and was entitled to one-fourth share. The evidence of one witness was taken yesterday in behalf of the complainant, after which the Vice Chancellor gave judgment for the defendants. Messrs Johnston and Immann appeared for the complainant and Messrs McLean and McKinnon for the defendants.

DOMINION BOARD OF TRADE.—From the West emanates an interesting proposal for the consolidation of the Boards of Trade throughout the Dominion. Like our Maritime Board of Trade, there is a body in the West known as the Associated Boards of Trade of Western Canada, and at its tenth annual convention, recently held in Winnipeg, Man., the following resolution was passed:—"That the Executive of this Board be a committee to communicate with and to act for this Board in conjunction with the Executive of forming a National Association of Boards of Trade for Canada; and the Executive to report to the Board at the next meeting." The next meeting of this Association will be held in the city of Fort William, Ont., on September 8th, 9th and 10th, when the report will be submitted. Accordingly, the Associated Board of Trade is inviting the Boards of Trade throughout the Dominion to send delegates to that meeting when the work of completing the formation of a National Association will, it is hoped, be completed. Already, the Council of the Montreal Board of Trade has intimated their inclination favorably to regard the proposal, while at the last convention of the Ontario Associated Boards of Trade, the following resolution was passed: "Resolved that a Dominion Board of Trade or Chamber of Commerce be formed representing and unifying commerce and the industries for the common good of the Dominion." Sir George E. Foster, Minister of Trade and Commerce, who was

present at the Ontario Board's meeting, expressed himself strongly in favour of the proposal, taking the view that a constant meeting together of merchants and traders from all parts of the Dominion and interchanging opinions and experiences would be of mutual benefit and of great benefit to the trade and commerce of Canada as a whole.

BAD ROAD.—There is a piece of road between McKay's corner at the Catholic Church and Mayne's brook, in Summerfield that is a constant menace to the safety of the travelling public. While other sections have splendid roads, though not so much as this one, no carriage would stand driving over that part of the road at least with any speed whatever. Perhaps the roadmaster has some explanation. If not some one should be answerable for the condition of a road that has received no attention apparently for twelve months, if not more.—L.

BIG CANNING CONCERN.—R. Clark & Co., Mt. Stewart are doing an immense business in canning berries. On Saturday this firm received a shipment of eighty barrels of blueberries from different parts of the Island and yesterday working over time till 10 o'clock at night they canned 27 barrels or 5400 lbs. Most of the finished product goes to Montreal and some to Hamilton, Ont. to be shipped to Western Canada. P. E. Island wants more enterprising business men like Mr. Clark of Mt. Stewart to develop the industries and open up new markets for the Island's products. The price of blueberries is 30¢ and some farmers' children are keeping the family can for as there is only 75 cents to boot in exchanging a barrel of berries for a barrel of flour.—L.

CORNWALL METHODIST CIRCUIT.—The services on Sunday last were of the most interesting character. Rev. E. Bell of Charlottetown presiding morning and evening at Cornwall and in the afternoon at Hampshire with power, vigor and acceptance. The text of the evening discourse was "Neither is there salvation in any other, for under heaven given among men whereby we must be saved," a sane scriptural and moving appeal and description of the Great Salvation bringing joy to the hearts of all Christ's followers and it is fervently hoped causing the might and great reaching of the hearts of the part of the unsaved. The evening service was further noteworthy for the rendering most ably of the Choir, of "God save the King" and Kipling's "Recessional." "Lord God of Hosts be with us yet. In our time of need forget not us." The Rev. George Orman presided at North Wiltshire and Kingston and the congregations were large all over the circuit.

RIFLE SHOOTING.—Members of the York Rifle Club and the Charlottetown Civilian Rifle Club are to meet at Kensington rifle range on Saturday afternoon next for rifle practice, and a cordial invitation is extended to all citizens and those who would make themselves proficient in the use of the rifle for defensive or offensive purposes, to go out and join in the practice shoot. This is a commonsense direct; to prepare, all of us, ourselves for the time when our services may be called upon. Lord Kitchener, the British Minister of War, in his address to the House of Lords indicated that the exigencies of the war would demand far more men from the Dominions than at present are being sent. In the near future the call to arms may be sounded for every available man, even as in Germany is being sounded to-day. Against such a contingency it would be in the highest degree the part of wisdom to prepare at once. An efficient rifle shot is a great asset in any fighting force. How much more so a crack marksman. A good many marksmen are born. Most are made. Steady practice makes them. The Kensington rifle range is open every afternoon to any who would care to go out and have rifle practice.

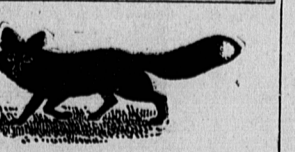
