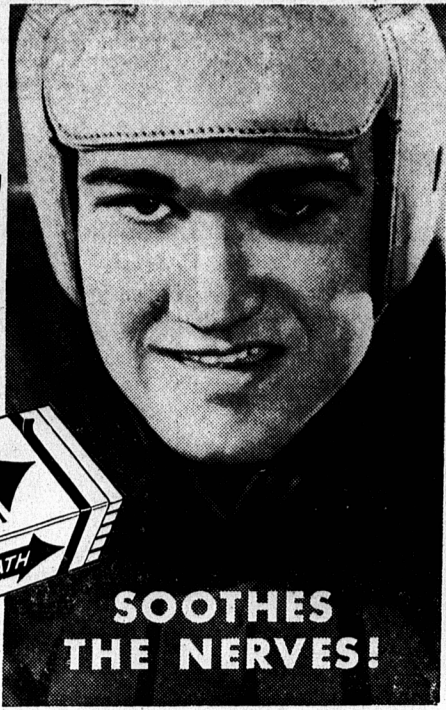

MRS. LINNIS K. JOUDREY

The death of Mrs. Linnis Joudrey of Gorham, New Hampshire, occurred in the St. Louis Hospital, Berlin, New Hampshire, on Monday August 2, 1937. The deceased whose maiden name was Ellie Beatrice Douglas, being a daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Douglas, Head of Hillsborough, P. E. Island was 26 years of age. Although she had not been in good health for some time her death came as a shock to the community. Good hopes had been entertained for her recovery until shortly before her death. On Saturday July 31st she entered the hospital at Berlin, but despite skillful nursing and medical attention she passed away on the following Monday. The late Mrs. Joudrey was well known in her own and surrounding communities. She was a kind neighbour and in her home a faithful

wife and mother and their loss will be deeply felt by her many friends. She leaves to mourn a sorrowing husband and little son, also her parents and the following sisters and brothers: Howard and Albion residing in Charlottetown; Wallace and Oliver at home; Mary (Mrs. Russell Douglas) and Alice also living in Charlottetown; Lola, Jean, Catherine and Dorothy at home. The funeral which was held on Thursday, August 5th at 2 p. m. from her late residence to Gorham Methodist Church was conducted by the Rev. H. O. Megeer. Gasoline Taxes Makes Good Roads

The earmarking of \$5,000,000 by the Michigan legislature from the current general revenue fund for highway improvement, probably marks the first instance in which a state has arranged a continuing appropriation from its general revenue for this purpose. The \$5,000,000 bill was passed June 10 and had earlier been passed by the Senate. There was a bill before the legislature to appropriate \$2,000,000 from the general revenue fund each year to go to the counties, to be used exclusively in highway improvement, and a bill of \$800,000 for snow removal. The theory back of these appropriations bills was that a good share of receipts of the state's sales tax, which go into the general revenue fund, comes from the sale of cars, tires, and accessories, and should go to keeping up the roads. Total receipts from Michigan's gasoline tax and auto license fees go to the highway departments, there being no diversion. Net total receipts from the state motor fuel tax in 1936 were \$25,739,000.

Speaker Outlines Adult Education Work To Meeting

Professor E. A. Corbett, Director of the Canadian Association for Adult Education, addressed a hall filled to capacity at Morrell on Saturday evening, October 9. Rev. E. M. Aitken presided as chairman and introduced the lecturer. Professor Corbett outlined the programme of the extension department of the University of Alberta in the field of popular education. As director of this work for fifteen years he had experimented with many kinds of programmes by radio, films, projectors, lectures, study groups, drama leagues and handicraft clubs. He particularly mentioned the value of films and slides in presenting popular education to adult groups and schools. Universities must bring the results of their thinking and research back to the people.

The idea of adult education is as old as history. It is having a rebirth in our organized and developed form throughout Canada today. He traced the recent history of Scandinavian countries, with their admirable development in the cultural and economic phases of living, to the slow and steady growth of adult education, which built up communities alert to the changes and needs of today. Education is a never-finished task. Adults can learn. Man has a series of mental rebirths through his whole life. We must develop a society which depends on the wisdom and knowledge of many, rather than on the uncontrolled impulses of a few. The study group is an effective way to achieve this end.

Mr. Jerome Gillis moved a vote of thanks to the speaker, seconded by Mr. Louis McGuire. Others joining in the discussion were Rev. Joseph Rooney, Mr. Daniel Mullins and Mr. J. C. Peters. The meeting closed with the National Anthem.

Money will be divided as follows:—1st \$12; 2nd \$9; 3rd \$6, remaining creditable qualifying entries \$4 each.
