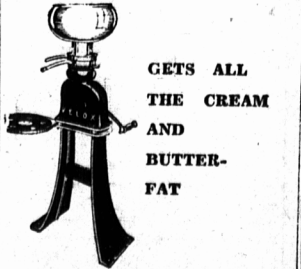
## Summerside Races

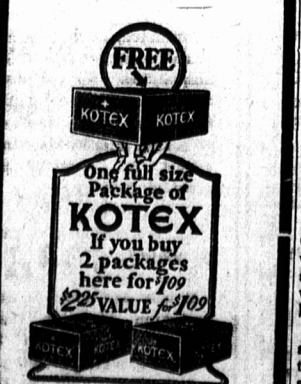
