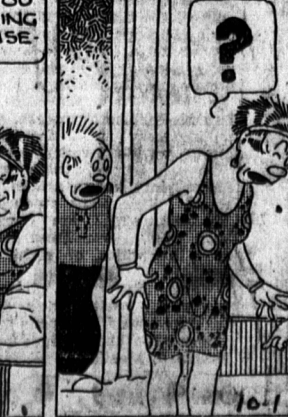

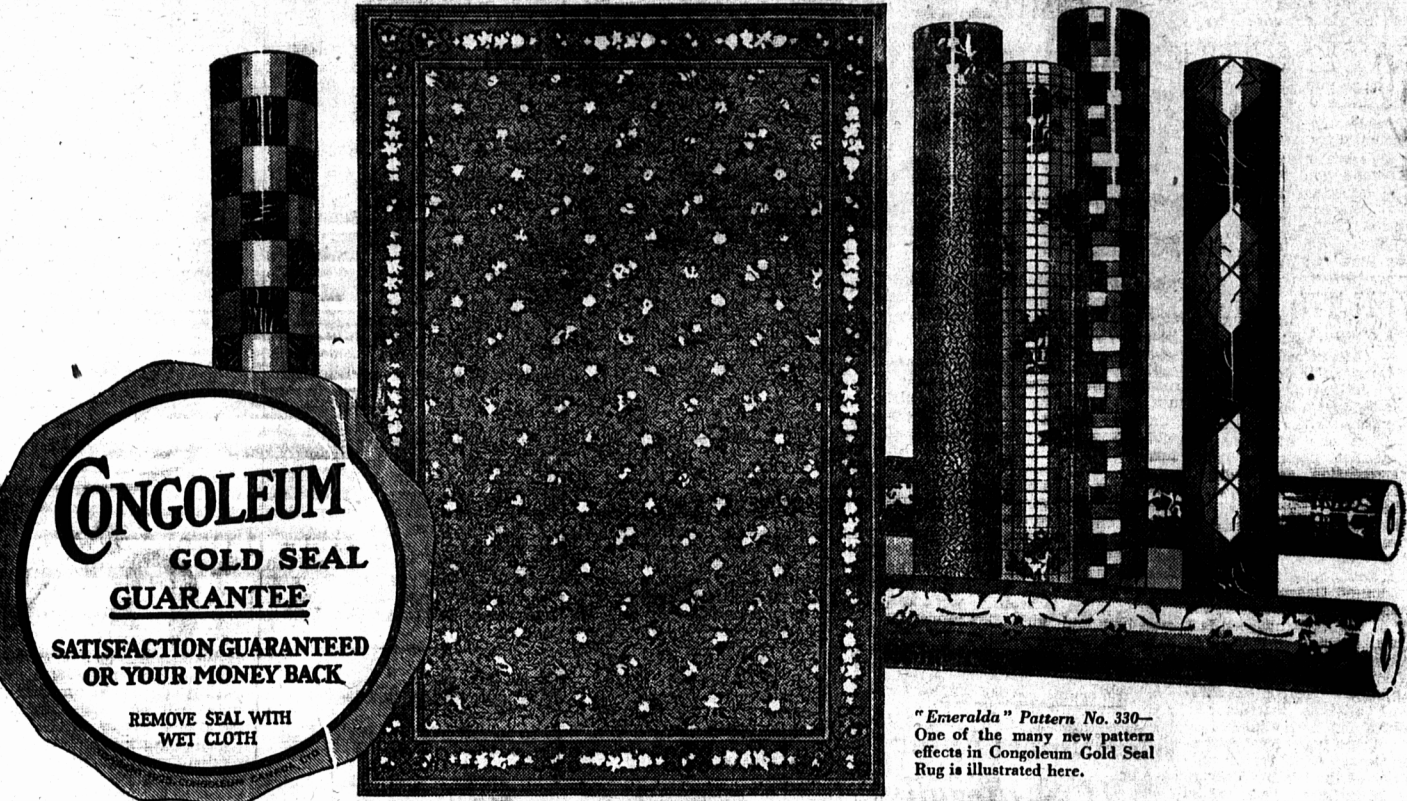

Resolution Provides For old Age Pensions

GREAT YARMOUTH, England, Sept. 28.—A resolution providing that pensions should be granted to persons on reaching the age of 65 on condition that the pensioners receive from "competitive employment" at that age, was adopted by an overwhelming majority at today's session at the annual conference of the National Union of Conservative and Unionist associations. At present old age pensions are granted to persons who have attained the age of 70 years. A mover of the pensions resolution proposed that the present labor exchanges throughout the country might be abolished and the £25,000,000 expended annually on their maintenance devoted to pensioning, at a rate of five dollars a week, the 100,000 aged workers who would benefit by the resolution.

The speaker also suggested that instead of reducing the beer tax in the next budget, the chancellor of the exchequer should transfer the \$50,000,000 obtained from the beer tax to the pension fund as well as a further \$25,000,000 from the tobacco tax.

The conference unanimously adopted another resolution recommending that all government departments, in placing contracts, should give preference to home and ample goods and produce.
