SAW GERMAN FLEET OF 68 WARSHIPS.

LONDON, April 29.—Captain Scott, commanding a Norwegian steamer chartered by the Belgian Relief Commission, reports the presence in the North Sea of a German fleet numbering no less than 68 vessels till told.

Capt. Scott, whose vessel has just come to port, reports that while crossing the North Sea he was held up by one of these German steamers. After an examination of his papers he was permitted to proceed. The German fleet was composed of vessels of all classes, from battleships to torpedo boats.

The date of Captain Scott's encounter and just where in the North Sea he sighted this German fleet has not been announced.

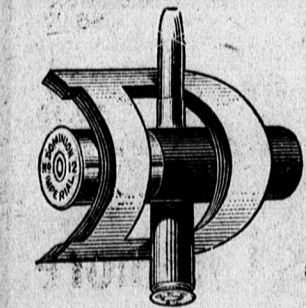

SUMMER STEAMERS—The s. s. Empress of the Charlottetown Steam Navigation Company, left Charlottetown yesterday at 1 p. m. with the intention of going to Pictou to get on the slip. She was only able to get as far as Wood Islands, where she met heavy ice from shore, from Wood Islands to Sea Cow Head and a change of wind is necessary to clear it away. The steamer will not go to Pictou now but will proceed to Summerside just as soon as there is any possible chance of getting out. If the press will sail from here on Sunday to take up the Summerside-Point du Chene route Monday. As soon as conditions will permit the Northumberland will go to Pictou to get on the slip.

The Church of Scotland Synod of Argyll met in New Rothesay Parish Church on Wednesday last week. Among the members present were: Revs. John Dickie, New Rothesay; Peter Dewar, North Bute; John Saunders, Kingarth; Angus MacPhee, Kilmarnock; Arthur Jenkinson, Inellan; A. W. Mitchell, Ardentinny; Alex. Cameron, Inverchlainn; Mason Sandbank; Alex. C. Robertson, Lochgilphead; Dougald MacCallum, Campbelltown; Murdoch Lamont, Oa.; John A. MacCormick, Ardchattan; and Dr. J. C. Russell, clerk. Rev. John MacLachlan, Govan, attended as a Commissioner from the Synod of Glasgow and Ayr. Mr. W. Dunlop Brown (New Rothesay) was the only elder in attendance; and Rev. D. W. BUMPER CROP IN WEST IF RAIN FALLS SOON.

OTTAWA, April 29.—The Minister of Agriculture has received encouraging reports of the conditions and prospects in the three prairie provinces. Mr. J. H. Grisdale, director of experimental farms, has just returned from the west, and has completed arrangements for the operation of twenty-five illustration stations in southern Alberta and southern Saskatchewan. The stations are forty-five acres each

and situated about thirty miles apart, so as to give easy access to most of the settlers. They will be devoted to showing the great advantages to be gained by scientific preparation of the soil, rotation of crops etc.

Rain is needed in the west, and with its advent there is promise of a bumper crop all through the country. Practically all the wheat is in now, most of it earlier than usual, and all through the southern sections, where the drought obtained last year, the moisture now in the soil is the heaviest on record.

There has been a tendency in the past to sow wheat on stubble land, with practically no preparation, but this year such lands have been thoroughly prepared, a very large percentage ploughing in the fall and all in fine condition, and as a large amount of rain fell subsequent to the ploughing, these lands are almost equivalent to those which had been summer fallowed. Taking it all round, the gain condition of the west are of the most promising kind.
