

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**Gleanings From Tryon And Vicinity**

A beautiful day, a splendid program and a fine appreciative audience, all contributed to make the unveiling of the memorial monument to the soldiers who participated in the Great War, a day that will be long remembered in Tryon. Much credit is due to Mr. H. A. McPhee for his untiring efforts in making the day such a success.

The monument stands on the school grounds, and is a beautiful grey granite stone. Upon its face are names of the following who lost their lives during the war: John Lyman Wood, Percy Farrow, Capt. Jas. Farrow. On the sides are the names of those who were in the service: Earl D. McPhee, Alfred Lefurgey, Geo. Hennessey, Everett Howatt, Chesley Howatt, Lewis Dawson, John Foy, Leo Callbeck, Alfred Cairns, Harold Leard, Everett Bell, Morley Bell, J. Earl Thompson, Thos. Dawson, Earl Howatt, Maynard Foy, Elmer McNeill, Thos. Fell, Guy Holland, Morley Mullins. A speakers' platform had been erected, and upwards of a thousand people were assembled.

The exercises were presided over by Governor Hartz at 3 p.m. He was received by the chairman, Rev. J. B. B. Dagggett. A group of little girls sang "O Canada," and little Ruth Ward presented His Honor with a bouquet of flowers. After a stirring address the flags were removed from the monument by the Governor. The last post was sounded by Sergeant Major Wm. DeCost, and the audience joined in singing the National Anthem.

The following speakers spoke:— A. E. McLean, M.P., Hons. J. H. Myers, W. B. Lea, Rev. Dr. Hartz and Rev. Mr. Muir. The speeches were interspersed with music under the direction of Dr. J. J. Sides. The Benediction Club sang "The Soldiers' Rest," and as one whom his mother comforteth. Gordon McCallum sang "The Deathless Army," and Prof. Jones was heard in a fine number. J. B. Lewis sang "Crossing the Bar."

During the exercises the chairman called Mr. and Mrs. Geo. W. Wood to the platform, their son being one of the killed. A deep and impressive silence rested upon the audience as the chairman received and seated them.

Rev. Dr. Hartz was heard with pleasure. Just seventy years ago he had addressed a public gathering in Tryon. His friends were delighted to see him so vigorous. The exercises were brought to a close by the audience joining in the National Anthem.

A splendid tea was served by the ladies, the proceeds being devoted to the Orphanage.

The Baptist Church had offered their splendid grounds and buildings that are nearby, for the day, and the tea was served there. The committee is to be congratulated upon carrying out such a heavy program without a hitch. The proceedings were of a dignified and impressive character, and everybody was pleased.

**Will Hunt Treasure In Nova Scotia**

NEW YORK, July 19.—Major B. A. Logan, manager of the mapping division of the Federal Aerial Surveys, left New York today for a treasure hunt in Nova Scotia, which may net him at least \$100,000 and perhaps \$2,000,000.

The treasure was the cargo of a French "pay ship" which fell into the hands of the English off Cape Breton Island about the year 1700. After various vicissitudes the crew of the French vessel managed to sink the treasure in Canadian lakes, from returning to claim it. All trace of it was eventually lost and repeated searches fail to give a hint of its whereabouts.

Major Logan discovered last winter in an old Spanish narrative an account of how the treasure was hidden in the hands of a Spanish privateer. The captain of this vessel hanged the Frenchman who gave him the information but the captain was prevented by the French from salvaging the treasure. He left the records for his son, however, and it is in this record which Major Logan is using as his guide.

**River Breakup is Big Sport Event in North**

TANANA, Alaska, July 19.—Here in the North one of the big sporting events of the season—one on which wagers are laid and speculation is keen—is the date of the Spring breakup of winter ice on the Yukon river.

Like this year, when the first warning was a sudden overflow, the water of a bet may learn of his good luck by the sweeping of a flood across the ice and then onward, filling the Yukon from bank to bank.

The overflow this season cut a channel mid-stream to the bottom of the river, the sinking waters leaving ice shelves hanging anchored to the shore. While in this condition the streams are not possible for navigation or surface travel. Frequently transportation of mails must temporarily cease, so the shut in resident is interested in just when the big break will come. He uses all his nature craft and Northland cunning to calculate the river in advance, backing his judgment with hard earned coin.

Usually the run of ice cakes down the Yukon lasts about eight days. The first boats from Dawson follow the ice down the Yukon and then turn south and up the Tanana river to connect with the Alaska railroad at Nenana, re-establishing traffic with the outside world.

Major Logan went up last spring and bought up all the land on which the treasure can possibly be hidden, if the Spanish records are accurate.

"All I have to do now is to dig," said the Major, just before his departure, "and I'm so sure I've got the right dope I'm willing to spend five months digging if necessary. I'll have two laborers helping me. That's all there is to my 'expedition'."
