(Canadian Press) MONTREAL, March 27.—The export trade in Canadian grain here today was again very slow and the volume of business in ocean grain room so far this week has also been small. There was some demand on spot for No. 2 feed oats and sales of odd loads were made at 1.12 cents per bushel under the Winnipeg may option C.I.F. Montreal, and bids of 10.12 cents per bushel over the May future were made for No. 2 Canadian Western P.O.B. Montreal, for first half May shipment. Prices for oats in the local market, closed 1.2 cent per bushel higher. The foreign demand for spring wheat flour continued of a very limited character. The local trade was also quiet but prices were steady. There were no further developments in the winter wheat flour situation. The tone of the market for milled remains steady under a fair demand.
