LONDON, Eng., June 21.—(By The Canadian Press)—The first woman to hold her office in the history of the Empire is Miss Jean Iris Howard, Acting Agent-General for Nova Scotia at London. When her father died, over a year ago, Miss Howard was appointed to succeed him, although the duties of the position would be a strain on most capable men. As her father's assistant for some years she had shown such high qualifications that there was little surprise when the Premier of Nova Scotia asked her to carry on.

Miss Howard's position is no sinecure. Her duties include the active encouragement of Nova Scotian business in England, the study of potential trade between the province and other countries, the guidance of prospective immigrants to Canada, and the representation of her province at many wearisome social functions. She herself feels certain that a woman is well qualified to do such work, except, she says, that she has difficulty winning the confidence of the men with whom she deals. Perhaps her greatest success is that she enjoys the respect and esteem of England's outstanding men. At the British Industries Fair banquet recently Miss Howard and Miss Margaret Bondfield, Minister of Labor in the Macdonald Government, were the only women present.

DEATH TAKES FR. S. DAIGLE

CHAPLAIN OF ST. MARY'S HOSPITAL FOR THE PAST 5 YEARS (Kankakee Exchange)

Reverend Simon Alphonse Daigle, for the past five years chaplain of St. Mary's hospital and former assistant pastor of St. Rose church, died Saturday evening, June 7, after an illness of seven months.

Funeral services will be held from St. Rose church at 10:30 o'clock Wednesday morning. The office for the dead will be at 10 o'clock. The Solemn Requiem Mass will be celebrated by Rev. J. M. Laroche assisted by Father St. John of the Diocese of Oklahoma and Father J. A. Dionne of St. Joseph's church, Brighton Park, Chicago. Burial will be made in St. Rose cemetery.

The body was taken from the Holy Name funeral establishment Sunday afternoon to St. Mary's hospital where friends may call this evening and tomorrow. Late tomorrow afternoon the body will be taken to St. Rose church and will lie in state until the time of the funeral.

Death was caused by heart disease, and at intervals he would suffer severe spells from which he rallied with difficulty. A few weeks ago he was feeling better and hopes were entertained for his recovery. For the past four or five days before his death, however, he gradually failed and all day Saturday his pulse was extremely high. Saturday afternoon he himself said that he would not survive until the next morning.

Father Daigle was born about 43 years ago at Rollo Bay, Prince Edward Island, the son of a French father and a Scotch mother. He received his college training at St. Dunstan's college, Charlottetown, then taught school a few years. He attended Laval university at Quebec, where he was ordained to the priest-

hood in the spring of 1914. He was a member of the Catholic Order of Foresters. Father Daigle had a large number of friends in Kankakee, having labored as assistant pastor of St. Rose church about ten years, arriving here in the summer of 1914. He was a zealous and tireless worker, always desirous of doing good, frequently at the cost of personal sacrifices. A most unassuming man, his work was nevertheless effective. For a number of years, his chief concern was the welfare of the parish grammar school for boys and at the same time he devoted considerable efforts to promoting Holy Name Society activities. During Father A. D. Granger's first illness, complete charge of the parish devolved upon him, and he was equal to the task. From here he was called to St. John the Baptist parish in Chicago, where his labors were not of long duration because of ill health. After a few months visit in the south, he came to St. Mary's hospital in this city where he regained his health and was able most of the time to fulfill the duties of chaplain. Father Daigle is survived by one brother, Joseph E. of Rollo Bay, Prince Edward Island and by a number of nieces and nephews of Rollo Bay, Boston, Mass., and Winnipeg, Canada. One of the relatives who will attend the funeral services is a nephew, Dr. Myles Daigle of Winnipeg. Father Daigle's other brothers preceded him in death, one dying in France while in service with the Canadian Expeditionary Force. Tonight at 7:30 o'clock at St. Joseph's hall all members of Canadian Court, No. 56, C. O. F. will meet to make arrangements for Father Daigle's funeral, Tuesday evening at 7 o'clock at St. Rose hall all members of the Holy Name Society will meet for the same purpose.

CANADIAN NURSES MEET IN REGINA

REGINA, Sask., June 21.—(By The Canadian Press)—The annual meeting of the Canadian Nurses' Association will be held here, June 24-28, inclusive. The nurses will be welcomed by Dr. J. T. M. Anderson, Premier of Saskatchewan, Dr. W. C. Murray, President of the University of Saskatchewan, and His Worship Mayor McArs, of Regina. An address on "The Nurse and the Public" by Dr. G. M. Weir, of the University of British Columbia will feature the opening session. Private Duty Nursing, Public Health Nursing, and Nursing Education are among the topics to be discussed by the Association. Commercial exhibits and Educational films will be provided to show how the importance of good health and good nursing may be placed before the public. Members will also hear a report of delegates to the meeting of the Grand Council, International Order of Nurses. On the closing day new officers will be elected. The President for the past year is Miss Mabel F. Hersey, of Montreal.
