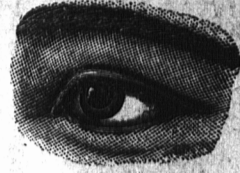

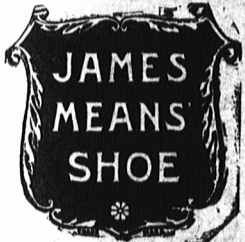

Exchanges received yesterday contain the following further details of the death of Windsor LeLacheur, at Roehampton: Lying across his bed with his fur overcoat and hat on, Windsor LeLacheur, a well known young man, was found dead shortly before 6 o'clock yesterday afternoon with a gaping bullet wound near his heart. Lying at his side was a 38 calibre revolver, with which the deed had been committed. Apparently it was a case of suicide. He had not been well for the last week and since Sunday had acted rather strangely. His friends have continuously watched him until yesterday afternoon when he went to the livery stable owned by Frank Wright. He sat down in front of the barn and was soon by several parties. Finally he went inside the office to lie down on the bed. A gun belonging to one of the men was hidden in the room. He secured this and shot himself. Presumably the only trouble he had to worry him was the care of some horses which he had on the road from the east, but they arrived yesterday morning. He saw them, and also his brother, who accompanied them. LeLacheur was 24 years old and comes from Murray Harbour, Prince Edward Island, where he had just spent the winter. He had lived here for a number of years, and was immensely popular. At the coroner's inquest which was held on the 25th April the evidence showed clearly that it was a case of suicide, and the jury's verdict was that Windsor LeLacheur committed suicide by shooting while temporarily insane.

YESTERDAY the Stanley took from C-o getdown to Pictou two cars of hay, six of way freight, six horses and twenty-two passengers.

A machine designed to automatically cancel the postage stamps affixed to letters mailed in the Charlottetown Post office was installed yesterday. This device will do away with the old system of cancelling by hand which has required a lot of time. With the new machine the letters will be done quickly, the letters and cards being put into the machine and rapidly cancelled and numbered, saving much time and labor.

In the event of their not being able to make arrangements with the Water Commissioners of the City of Charlottetown the railway officials have been instructed to install their own water system. The supply will, if practicable, be drawn from a spring just north of the Exhibition grounds near the Lower St. Peter's Road. Yesterday a survey was made by Engineer Lawrence preparatory to laying a water main if necessary. The claim made by the railway is that they have to pay 20 a thousand gallons, which is twice what citizens pay. Last year they paid over a thousand dollars for water. This year they will use more water and a reduction is requested in the rate.
