

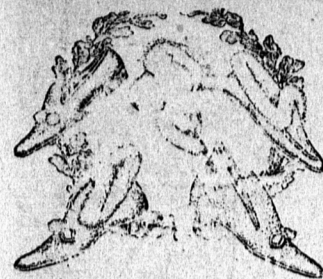

DEATH OF A NOTED CLERGYMAN.
HALIFAX, October 23—A telegram to his son in law, M. O. Crowell, yesterday, announced the death after a brief illness of the Rev. J. A. Rogers, D. D., for many years pastor of the leading Methodist Churches of this city, and one of the most eloquent preachers in the Maritime Provinces. Few men were better known or more highly respected than Dr. Rogers, not only in Halifax, but throughout the length and breadth of this province, where the greater part of his long, faithful and distinguished ministry was spent. He filled with distinction every office in the gift of the Methodist Conference, and exercised an influence as wide as it was beneficent. At the time of his death Dr. Rogers was pastor of Gower street church, St. John's, Newfoundland, one of the finest and most important churches in the connection. He thus closed his life in harness and in the land that gave him his birth. He is survived by his widow, a daughter of the late Dr. Rufus Black, of this city, and by three daughters and three sons. Rev. A. S. Rogers, of Yarmouth, is his oldest son. Dr. Rogers was seventy-two years of age.

IN MEMORIAM
MR. JOHN MARSHALL.
The death on Sunday, Oct. 19th, of the late Mr. John Marshall, of Kingston, P. E. I., removes a honored influence for good, from that township. For twenty years Mr. Marshall resided in Kingston, and gathered to himself during that time a body of friends who were attached by the simple, yet strong constancy and honest life of the departed. He was a convinced Presbyterian and counted it a privilege to keep a "prophets church" in his home of all visiting clergymen of his church; and he never failed to take a full interest in every cause which had the welfare of men at heart. He leaves to mourn this great loss, his widow his sons, Duncan and George; his daughter, Mrs. Boyd Livingston; his brothers, Robert, David and Lewis; all at Covehead; and Mrs. Hughes of Winsloe Road, and Mrs. George Douglas of Charlottetown, also sisters of the deceased, to all of whom respectful sympathy was well expressed by the largely attended funeral on Tuesday Oct. 21st, when the Rev. J. H. McHattie, assisted by the Rev. A. J. W. Back of Georgetown, and the Rev. George Orman of Cornwall, conducted the last sad rites at the home and graveside. It will be long before the community becomes to any degree reconciled to Mr. Marshall's decease; but the feeling that it is such material as he, of which a solid and successful citizens life is built, will enshrine his memory securely in minds and heads.

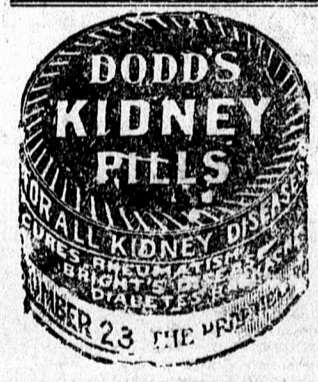

MAY STOP SALE OF SUFFRAGETTE PAPER.
NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—Steps to stop the sale of The Suffragette, the English militant official organ, may be taken to-day, by Anthony Comstock, when he will decide whether criminal action will be taken against those responsible for its circulation. Mr. Comstock, as head of the New York Society for Prevention of Vice held a long conference on the matter with District Attorney Whitman, in the latter's office, late yesterday afternoon. The discussion of white slavery and sex hygiene, it is said, transcended the laws of decency. Neither would disclose their plans afterward, but it was learned that Mr. Comstock had decided to go into the matter thoroughly, so that no trouble can come in case it takes an international turn, and if satisfied with the criminality of the paper's sale, procure such warrants, and raid every place and home he knows the copies to be in. His plan then will be to prosecute both the distributors and the purchasers. There was a report that the postal authorities will also take action, but this could not be verified. Thousands of copies of the paper have been distributed since they were first put on sale at the lecture by Mrs. Emmeline Pankhurst, in Madison Square Garden, Tuesday night.
