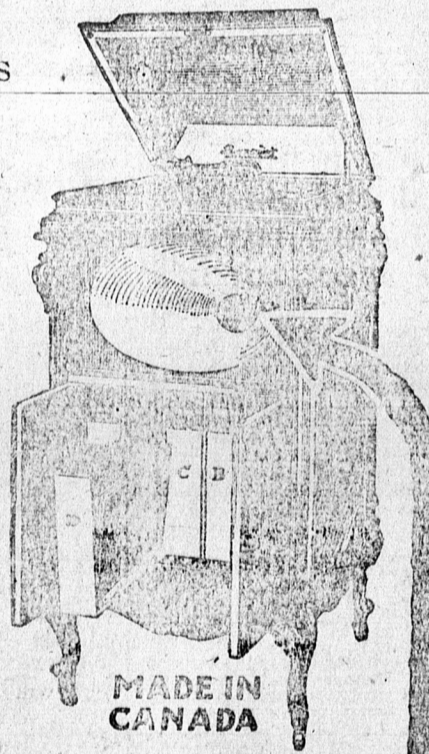
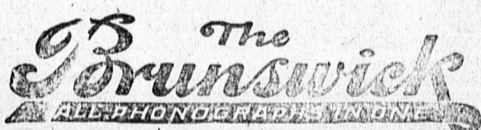

were being transported from Montreal to a medical man in a Cape Breton town. To save the doctor trouble the stolen liquor was made up into 180 or 200 bottles. The car was in the yard here all day and yet in broad daylight the car was robbed.
