The Stanley made the trip from Pictou to Georgetown yesterday in 3 1/2 hours and the special reached the city at 12.50. The Stanley's cargo to Georgetown included 6 cars hay, and three cars way freight. There were also 12 passengers and 75 bags of mail.

A St. John's Nfld. despatch says 23 American fishing vessels which have been seeking cargoes of frozen herring in Connaught bay have been unable to obtain them. It is feared that this branch of the winter herring fishery will be a total failure, herring apparently having abandoned Placentia and Fortune Bays, with the lesser inlets which previously foraged their favorite haunts.

Mrs. George E. Goff of Woodville and Miss Katie M. Docherty of Cardigan left Boston, Jan. 11th for their home, after an extensive visit with their sisters Mrs. Paige and Mrs. Guild. Mrs. Goff had quite a reunion with many of her old school mates of Chaucey Hall, and Mrs. Brown's private school of Cambridge, Mass. They both enjoyed the Christmas shopping and decorations and especially the Christmas services and music of the "Hub".

LAST year Fred G. Spencer brought Nordica to St. John. He met with success. This year he had intended bringing Melba here, but will be unable to do so. Mr. Spencer has been for some time corresponding with Mr. Ellis of Boston, Melba's manager, in the hope of getting this famed artist for a series of concerts, but cannot arrange it. Six months before Madame Melba came to America all her dates were filled and as none have been cancelled, it is impossible for St. John to have a show. But Mr. Spencer hopes to be in it for next year. He has been asked to manage a series of concerts in the provinces to be given by Mme. Kir, by Lunn, the noted English contralto, now taking the part of Kundry in Parsifal in Boston, but also she is a great singer her name is not well enough known here for her to prove a good proposition.—St. John Sun.

RAILWAY MEETINGS

A series of public meetings is being held in the northern portions of Lots 43 and 46 for the purpose of getting the Elmira Branch railway located a mile or so further north than the line located last Fall by the engineers. This line is more than a mile south of the centre of the island, and starts both from Souris and Harmony, it being generally conceded that the line from Harmony is a blind, and that the intention is to run the line from Souris, which means bringing the line south and beyond reach of the north side entirely.

The first meeting was held on Monday evening at Souris Line Road north school house. Among those present at this meeting were: Joseph D. McCormack, Local Pole Director, Lib. Ass. J. A. McDonald, Harnamville; Andrew J. McEachern, Alex. D. McDonald, J. McDonald, James McEachern, M. McLean, Black Bush; Andrew McInnis, John Gillis, John McEachern, Donald Gillis, William Leslie, Souris Line Road; Daniel McNeill, Postmaster Donald McIsaac, Rock Barra; Angus McAuley, Joseph D. McCormack, Lib. Poll Director took the chair and the undersigned was appointed Secretary. There being no public men of fame as orators and political workers present, a speaking was more of a conversational affair among the local men present, for the purpose of organization and for taking the proper steps to influence the powers that be, to see the injustice of the present location, and the urgency of pressing the Harmony route rather than the Souris route and getting committees appointed to get up a monster petition to be sent to Ottawa when the House meets.

The route pressed for is.—Starting at Harmony thence run north to a point at or near McCarthy's on the opposite side of the hill, a mile north of Harmony Station, thence east to Eimira, striking the East Battle Road at the centre which would be at or near Fry's.

Resolutions with a view of bringing this about were unanimously passed. A committee consisting of A. J. McEachern, J. A. McDonald, Daniel McNeill, Donald Gillis and Donald McIsaac were appointed to draw up a petition and have it signed by the people, and sent to J. J. Hughes, M. P. for conveying to the Minister of Railways.

RUSSIAN ADMIRAL'S CHARTS WORTHLESS

LONDON, Jan. 7.—A despatch to the Japanese legation from Tokio in confirming the announcement of the raising of the blockade of the Liao Tung peninsula adds: "For the present, however, no ships except these in the Japanese service will be allowed to enter Port Arthur."

ST. PETERSBURG, Jan. 7.—The following is the text of Emperor Nicholas' despatch as cabled from Port Arthur by way of Tien Tsin today: "I allow each officer to profit by the reserved privilege to return to Russia under the obligation not to take further part in the present war or to share the destinies of their men."

PARIS, Jan. 7.—Information received in official quarters here shows that Vice-Admiral Rojestvensky's charts of the waters in which the Russian second Pacific Squadron is now cruising are defective and practically worthless. This arouses an apprehension of a possible catastrophe, as it is known that the charts do not show the recent hydrographic dangers of the Indian ocean.

PARIS, Jan. 7.—After conferring with Foreign Minister Delcasse, a leading diplomat said today that mediation in the Japanese-Russian war would be as acceptable to Russia now as it would have been to the north after the defeat at Bull Run. The belief is growing that Great Britain's anxiety for mediation is not entirely disinterested. A British official recently said: "If Europe or America do not intervene, Japan and Russia will make their own terms of peace without consulting Europe or America."

This leads diplomats to say that Great Britain is less desirous of peace than to secure a voice in the terms of peace.

Lieut. General Fock, "Smirnoff" and Goldblatnik and Rear Admiral Willmann, will be brought to Japan as prisoners of war.

Lieut. General Stoessel will leave Dalny Jan. 12 on a Japanese transport for Nagasaki. He will be accompanied by the other paroled officers. The Russians probably will remain in Japan a few days and then proceed on a French steamer to Europe, going by way of the Suez canal.

General Nogi reports that the officers paroled to date number 411 and orderlies 229.
