Black Fish At Borden

PORT BORDEN, Sept. 1.-Cars from many parts of the Island and several having summer tourists have been here taking pictures of the 64 black-fish, some of them 20 feet long, which swam ashore a mile and a half from the railroad docks and which supplied the townspeople with valuable meat. This meat was cut up, put in bags and taken to Summerside and put in cold storage later to be fed to the animals on the fox farms.

Some miles west of Borden the "whales," as many called them, swam to Portage where on an Island a half mile from shore, nearly three hundred became stranded and these are now being disposed of, many of them being dissected to be used later on for fox farm food.

Jack Kennedy of O'Leary told a reporter about twenty years ago a 30 foot whale came ashore near O'Leary but that this was the first time since that any large fish had come ashore in this part of the Island and that to have 300 black-fish ashore is something unprecedented.

At Borden the fish were secured by Wm. McConnis, Wm. Noonan, J. V. McDonald, Alden McCarver and others some of whom got as high as \$60 for a single fish. The fish are black with red flesh that resembles horse meat.

JOURNALIST DELIGHTED WITH VISIT HERE

Mr. S. Hayward, Jr., Hayward News Service, Meredith, N.H., is at present spending a holiday in the Province. Mr. Hayward is well known in the journalistic profession as a member of an agency that circulates news through the New England States and in Eastern Canada. I think Prince Edward Island is one of the finest places I have ever visited and I can see where, if your Board of Trade and Tourist Association go in for some U. S. A. advertising you will, in a few years, have so many tourists here you will not be able to take care of them. All you have to do is to 'tell the world' about the beauties and pleasures of this Island and you will get the folks and the money. When you think of Boston alone having over a million people, and New York City with nearly ten millions, tens of thousands of whom are making money hand over fist and looking for new places to go and spend it, you can realize how profitable advertising in the States to bring tourists here would be. I see cars from many of our States all over the Island, but where you now get one you could get ten in the next few years by doing effective publicity in the way we, in New England, do it to get visitors from other parts of the States. In New Hampton alone we spend a hundred thousand dollars a year to get the tourist trade, and these tourists, who crowd our hotels and resorts, bring many millions each summer into the State where I am located.

Her death in the full bloom of womanhood, is a terrible blow to the home, where her beloved presence was so welcome for only a few months, she attended Mass on Sunday, July 27th, and she greeted her friends with that pleasant smile, which was one of her greatest charms.

In the early part of her life, she was an ideal nurse, her dear mother was her special care for fifteen years, an invalid and in all those years, by her tender care and solicitude alleviated her every pain until death called her to Eternal Rest and her father, the late James Reid was stricken with a lingering illness and for six months, she assisted her brothers and sisters to make his last days happy. 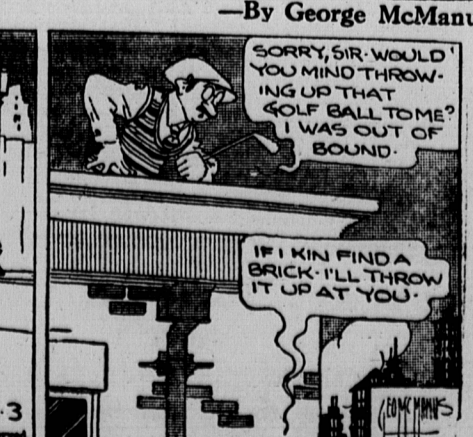
