DESTROY MUSTARD IN GRAIN FIELDS BY SPRAYING WITH 2, 4-D

The Prince Edward Island Department of Agriculture will pay one-half of the cost of 2,4-D, used in spraying grain fields infested with wild mustard.

Agencies handling 2,4-D preparations for the control of weeds are asked to co-operate. These remedies should be sold to bona fide farmers at one-half their retail value. The other half of the cost will be paid the vendor by the Department of Agriculture on presentation of a statement, giving the name of the farmer making the purchase, the quantity purchased and the cost of same.

When mustard is in full blossom get out your potato sprayer, slice all but the surface nozzle, mix 2,4-D according to directions on a container, apply at low pressure, and you will destroy this year's crop of mustard, without injury to grain, at a cost to you of less than fifty cents per acre for material used. Clean sprayer thoroughly before using for potatoes.
