We are getting fed like Lords, and especially on Sundays we sure have a royal feast. It is rumored around camp that we are getting horses but I don't know whether to believe it or not as we have been going to get them ever since we left Annapolis. My only hope we will. There was great excitement among the Island boys here the other day when Bill Delaney from Kensington, who is back from the front, wounded, came up to our camp with about a pound of Hickey & Nicholson's twist tobacco and he gave all the boys some. That sure was good of him and it would be a good ad for the tobacco. It doesn't matter where you go you can't get any tobacco an Islander likes better than H. I received the papers all right a day after your letter. I met a fellow last night who told me that the R. C. R. are on their way over and will get here pretty soon. I think that is about all the news just now."

BRAVE CANADIANS
LONDON, Sept. 18.—The Military Cross has been awarded to Captain Hugh Wilderspin Niven, of the Princess Patricia's, "for conspicuous gallantry and coolness during the very heavy bombardment on the 8th of May at Bellegarde Lake, east of Ypres, when his battalion suffered very heavy casualties. All senior officers being disabled, he found himself in charge, and continued to command the battalion with great ability until the 15th of May. He had previously been brought to notice for his consistent good work as a transport officer, and as an adjutant has done good service. He was once wounded." The Distinguished Conduct Medal has been awarded to Corporal Pym of the Canadian Dragoons, "for conspicuous gallantry at Festubert on the 26th of May. He went out 100 yards to a wounded man between the trenches. Having reached him, he called for assistance. A sergeant went to his aid, but was shot through the thigh and unable to move. Corporal Pym returned to the trench and with the assistance of two men went out again and brought the wounded man into safety under shrapnel and rifle fire, which was continuous."

EDMONTON, Alta., Sept. 20.—Alberta's wheat crop, which is now practically all cut, is, according to a statement of the Deputy Minister of Agriculture, the largest and best in the history of the province, and is worth nearly \$20,000,000. This compares with a value of slightly more than \$15,000,000 last year, the approximate 25 per cent. increase being in spite of much lower prices.

While Alberta is a mixed farming province, and in a large measure owes its prosperity to this fact, more wheat has been grown this year than ever before, and wheat forms a much larger proportion of the crop. In some districts, even in the northern part of the province and in the Edmonton district, farmers have devoted almost all their acreage to wheat.

WINNIPEG, Sept. 20.—Although the rain has somewhat delayed threshing throughout Manitoba, the Canadian Northern Railway crop bulletin, shows that good progress has been made in many of the districts. Along the Ridgeville sub-division the grain is now all cut, and eight cars were loaded last week at one station alone. In the Miami district 65 per cent. of the harvesting is completed.
