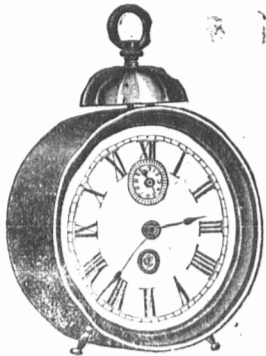

LAST October a small consignment of pears was received in this city by J. A. Farquharson & Co. On examination by Fruit Inspector Richard Burke they were found to be fraudulently packed. They had been shipped from Port Williams, N. S. Mr. Burke instructed Inspector Vroom of Nova Scotia to lay complaint under the Fruit Marks Act, against J. D. Bezanon, whose name was on the packages as packer of the fruit, with the result that he was fined a dollar for each package besides the costs of suit. Mr. Burke has several suits pending against Ontario packers whose fruit has reached this market giving evidence of fraudulent packing. The Fruit Marks Act is a good one and it is well that its provisions are being enforced. It is also well that dishonest packers should know that they may not violate it with impunity.

GRANVILLE ITEMS.—The weather for the past few days has been very mild after the severe snap. The people around here are now preparing for the woods. Deputy Stream Division is now, after its death, like silence coming to the front again. Quite a number have joined during this last quarter, and more are proposed. SUPREME COURT.

Monday, Jan. 18.

The Court opened at 11 a. m.
The King vs. Richard Collins, Accused for assault. Prisoner did not appear and bail was also ordered to be returned.
The King vs. William McCabe, Prisoner arraigned on a charge of jail breaking and pleaded guilty. His Lordship imposed sentence of three months in addition to his four and a half months yet to serve.

The King vs. Daniel McCallum, Action of stealing from the person. Attorney General Peters asked for a Nolle Prosequi. The prosecutor Scott requesting that no action be taken as he was intoxicated at the time the robbery was alleged to have taken place. His Lordship ordered that a Nolle Prosequi be entered and the bail discharged.

A. J. B. Mellish appeared for the defence. This ended the criminal docket.
Girard vs. Hennessey: This was an action for \$120 debt brought about by delivery of undertaker's goods from the Montreal firm to Michael Hennessey of this city. Hennessey admitted the debt but claimed half the freight, which he alleged plaintiff had promised to pay. This the plaintiff denied. Evidence of plaintiff was admitted by commission and Mr. Hennessey occupied the stand all the afternoon. Morson K. C. for plaintiff, McLean K. C. for defendant.
