From a military point of view this training gives the younger generation the fundamental principles which fit them for a military calling and which are deserving of encouragement. Our boys take a great interest in the work and exhibit wonderful dexterity in going through the exercises. The exercises are very interesting also to spectators especially when such work is performed as our boys go through. They will give a public demonstration on Thursday night next in Market Hall when all who can possibly do so should attend. Besides these exercises there will be a literary and musical program taken part in by some of our best local talent.
