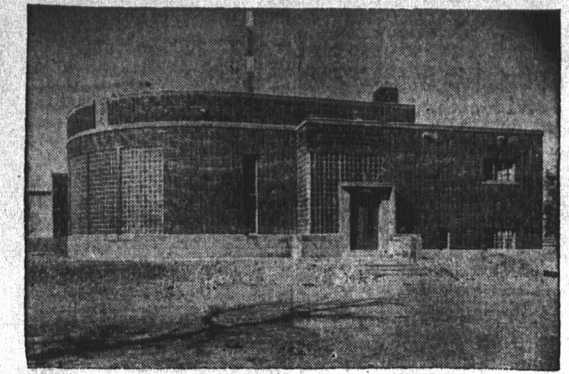


Formal Opening of Radio Station CBA, Sackville, N.B.

MR. MURDOCK BOUCHARD

Mr. Murdock Bouchard, aged 71, a retired employee of the Standard Oil Co., died at his home in San Pablo, California, on Saturday evening March 4th, 1939. His wife, six daughters and two sons were at his bedside when the end came, also present were his beloved pastor, Rev. Fr. Earnest Giovanni who administered the last rites of the Church and his personal physician Dr. K. Dally. Mr. Bouchard was a member of St. Paul's Church and of the Holy Name Society. His peaceful, beautiful death gave testimony to the devout Catholic life he always lived. The deceased formerly lived at Cardigan, Prince Edward Island, and came to California in 1907. MRS. ELLA M. MACLEOD

It is with a profound sense of regret that we report the death of Mrs. Ella M. MacLeod, who passed away at the Deaconess Hospital in Boston, Massachusetts, Thursday, March 3, 1939, after a brief illness of three days.

Mrs. MacLeod was born at Rosemeath, in this Province, and was the daughter of the late Duncan MacIntyre and Flora MacIntyre, who survives her. She was a resident of Brookline since her marriage in 1901 to Daniel M. MacLeod, a son of the late Duncan and Sarah MacLeod of St. Peter's Bay, and resided with her husband at 15 Holdan Street, Brookline, for about twenty years. For many years she was an active, faithful, and conscientious member of The First Presbyterian Church in Brookline, and was Treasurer of the Women's Missionary Society at the time of her death. She was a loving wife, an affectionate sister, and a dutiful daughter. During the summer of thirty-eight years she returned to her old home at Rosemeath, in order that she might have the pleasure of being united with her parents. She was a loyal and sympathetic friend, and her kindly disposition endeared her to many friends by whom she was held in high esteem.

Funeral services were held at the Presbyterian Church on Sunday, March 5, 1939, Reverend Doctor MacDuffie, Pastor, officiating. The edifice was crowded with long time friends and neighbors, whose presence, with a profusion of beautiful floral offerings, attest the affection and regard in which she was held. She was laid to rest in Walnut Hill, a beautiful cemetery in the southern section of the town of Brookline. Surviving her, besides her husband and her mother, are two sisters, Mrs. J. Henry MacLeod and Mrs. Gordon I. MacLaren, a brother Duncan, all residing in Brookline, and a brother Daniel, at home.

Former Federal Minister Passes

SAINT JOHN, N. B., April 3—Hon. Rupert W. Wigmore, 63, Dominion Minister of Customs and Inland Revenue in 1920, died at his home today. He suffered a heart attack Saturday.

Mr. Wigmore was elected to the House of Commons in Saint John City in 1917. Three years later he served in the Conservative Cabinet of Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen. He was not a candidate in the next Dominion election.

For years, until 1936, Mr. Wigmore was commissioner of water and sewerage for Saint John. He had been president of the union of New Brunswick municipalities

for two years and was once superintendent of maintenance of New Brunswick highways. Last July he was appointed chairman of the Saint John executive of the provincial Conservative association. He is survived by his wife, a son, Roy D. H. Wigmore, Larder Lake, Ont., and a daughter, Miss Ethel Wigmore, New York.

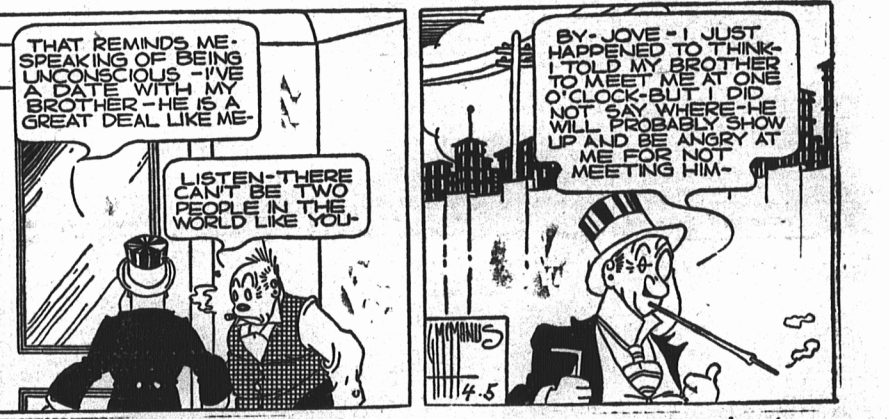

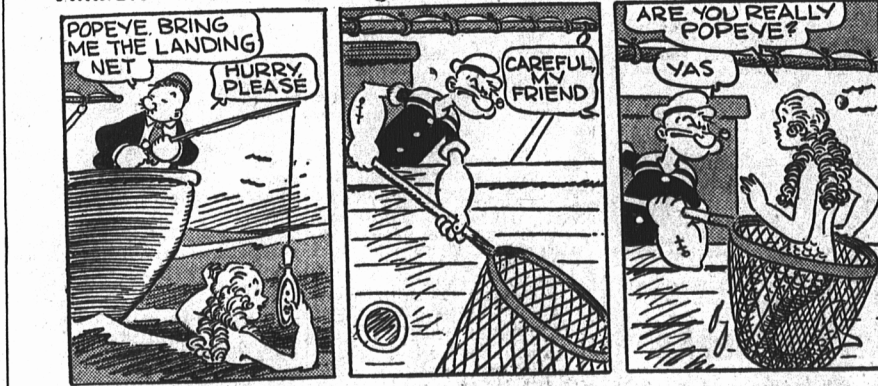
