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CHINA HAS ACCEPTED HARDING'S INVITATION

Formal Acceptance From France, Great Britain, Italy and Japan Expected Within Few Days. Foreign Delegates May Number 1,000.

WASHINGTON, August 19.—The United States Government's invitation to participate in a discussion of Pacific and Far Eastern problems at the disarmament conference was formally accepted by China yesterday, with a pledge that her representative would approach the task with a sincere sense of its significance and with a spirit of "perfect frankness and cordiality."
