

Abegweits And Rangers Again Battle To Draw

"Kick" McCann Proved Red Shirt Nemesis in one all Ninety Minute Deadlock Last Night.

Once again Abegweits and Dalhousie Rangers failed to reach a verdict after ninety minutes of exciting hockey, and when the final bell sounded both teams left the ice deadlocked at a 1 all score. The first period, although scoreless, was well punctuated with fast and handy hockey, with Abegweits popping out on the blades to out-pace the Rangers for the best part of the session. However, Kick McCann proved their undoing in this period as well as the ones following. He simply could not be beaten on long shots, and all individual efforts over his blue line were looked after by the ever watchful and scintillating defence of Graham and Walker.

Both teams counted in the second session, which by the way produced the best hockey of the evening. Walter Lawlor counted on a pass from Schwab at the three minute mark, and seven minutes later LeBlanc tied a waist high shot past Stull from just outside the blue line. Stull had a hold of the disc, but he angled his way over his left leg and into the twine. This goal proved a tough one for the Abegweits, who, up to this point had the better of the play and incidentally looked as if they would be on the top side of the counting at the end of the regular thirty minutes of hockey.

Abegweits, no matter how hard they tried, and no matter how many "breaks" came their way, could simply not get into scoring position to beat the hawk-eyed "Kick" McCann, who before the night work was over turned as the fifty-eight shots blazed at his defence. Stull, although only handling thirty-two, had a good night, and saved many hard drives which looked like certain tallies, especially on two occasions when he was forced to flash from his net to head-off Ranger forwards who came rushing in for scores.

Abbies' big chance to turn the tide of battle came in the opening of the third period when "Pop" Kerr, hefty Ranger right winger was given a ten minute lift for throwing his stick just as Jack Kane was rushing in for what looked like a certain goal. Three minutes later Duke Taylor was sent to the "pen" to keep company with Kerr for two minutes.

This is where "Kick" McCann gave the fans an exhibition of goal-minding from long range. For ten minutes Abbies threw four men up on the attack, but instead of getting anywhere they seemed to skate in each other's way, while combination efforts were thrown to the four winds, so anxious were the players to score the winning goal. Dalhousie players were more than brilliant during this juncture. They tucked in behind their blue line, and waited for the Abbies to come to them, and when they did, they either balled up their combination or poke-checked them back into neutral ice. Had the forwards gotten together in concentrated attacks, instead of leaving their combination until after they worked

inside the blue line, a different tale might be chronicled this morning. However, its mighty easy too criticize from a fandom point of view, suffice to say that each and every player gave his all in herculean endeavors to clinch the verdict, especially great little Walter Lawlor and "Baldy" Schwab, two of the most outstanding players on the ice. The Abegweits defence was perfect and never worked better this season. Taken all in all the homesters, and Dalhousie too, stood up well in the face of the terrific pace, especially when one considers that these teams had just finished a tough schedule on the mainland and had not fully recovered from the ordeal.

There was one thing that stood out in bold relief last night, and that was the whole-hearted applause given Dalhousie players, McCann especially on the great stand they made in the face of the heavy odds against them. It was a gesture of goodwill and no doubt much appreciated by the visitors.

Y. BOWLING United Fishermen Make Suggestions

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 27.—(By The Canadian Press)—Claiming that nothing has been done for the fishermen comparable to what the Dominion Government has done for agriculture and asking for a comprehensive and intensive effort to place the Canadian fishing industry on a profitable and business-like basis, delegates from the United Maritime Fishermen presented an appeal today to Hon. E. N. Rhodes, Minister of Fisheries.

Alfred Hanlon, Canso, N. S. president, and Bruce Burke, Drum Head N. S., vice president, laid before the Minister a resolution drawn up at a meeting of the federation in Halifax last Friday. Mr. Rhodes gave the brief considerable study but advised the delegation that the department was doing everything possible under present economic conditions, to grapple with the unsatisfactory situation existing in this important industry. He will discuss the matter with the Maritime officials again tomorrow but no definite decision as to the extent the government will be able to act, will be available for some time.

The United Maritime fishermen asked the government to place research men in the field to study marketing and other phases of the industry, establish marketing agents in foreign countries to represent the organized fishermen, broadcast regularly the trend of prices and market conditions, and to carry on with a competent staff of field men, educational work in production and selling.

Pays Tribute

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 29.—(By The Canadian Press)—Tribute to Rev. Joseph Annand, retired missionary, who died this week in Hantsport, N. S., was paid today by Rev. A. E. Armstrong, foreign missions secretary of the United Church of Canada.

Retroactive Tax Dumped Overboard

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 29.—Democratic and Republican tax farmers of the House today deftly dumped overboard retroactive tax increases sponsored by the administration and opposed general by business men.

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Canadians Getting Big Trade Orders

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 29.—(By The Canadian Press)—Representative of Canadian firms aboard the steamship New Northland, now on an exhibition cruise to Bermuda, British West Indies, British Guiana and the Bahamas, were successful in securing orders at Bermuda, according to Frederic Hudd, Canada Government Trade Commissioner. In a report to Hon. H. H. Steven, Minister of Trade and Commerce Mr. Hudd says that hardly a representative on the ship failed to secure orders.

"Obviously it is now too early to estimate the extent and value of the business actually done," continues Mr. Hudd. "Some of the orders were of such proportions that they netted the entire expense of the exhibition for the complete cruise. This gives some indication of what would have been accomplished with a more comprehensive and representative exhibition." Mr. Hudd stresses the importance of personal contact in the securing of the expansion of business with foreign countries.
