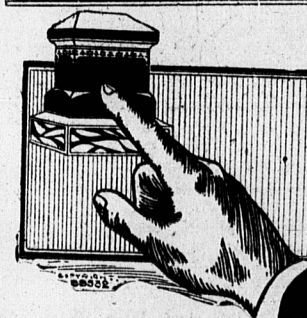

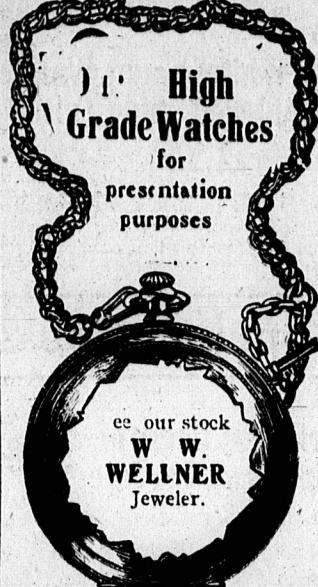

A., the Abegweits and the Victorias.
