### THE WEATHER

#### THE TEMPERATURE

(Special to The Guardian)

TOHONIO, Nov. 26.—Fresh to northerly winds, fair and cooler. THE WEATHER.—There was an intermittent snowfall yesterday. The first snow was in the morning, and very light, practically clearing away under the bright afternoon sun. But towards evening, there was a heavier fall and the wind increased. Night closed in disagreeable, but the wind held off, the snowfall ceased and it turned out a fine night, with several degrees of frost.

The highest temperature recorded yesterday was 33 degrees above zero. The lowest temperature registered on the previous night was 30 degrees above. At nine a. m. yesterday 33 degrees above was recorded and at nine p. m. 30 degrees above.

The tide will be high this morning at 10.09 and tomorrow at 11.00; it will be high tonight at 9.33 and tomorrow at 10.13.

The sun sets this afternoon at 4.19 and tomorrow at 4.14; it rises tomorrow morning at 7.48 and tomorrow at 7.19.

The moons sets this afternoon at 3.40. The last quarter of the moon was on Friday, Nov. 21st at 3.57 a. m. There will be a new moon on Thursday, Nov. 27th at 9.41 p. m. The length of today will be nine hours and three minutes.

### POOR LORENGUIA DIES OF TUBERCULOSIS.

LONDON, Nov. 26.—Prince Lohen Lorenguia, the son of the famous king of Matabeleland, who caused the British government so much trouble in the eighties of the last century, died in poverty on Monday in a humble dwelling at Pendleton, near Manchester, which he had been occupying with his white wife and their four children. He was 37 years of age.

After the Matabele war he came to England, and performed in an African show, afterwards playing a part in the pantomime "Robinson Crusoe", in which he impersonated "Man Friday."

For some years he had been working in a coal mine, and death was caused by consumption which was accelerated by the fumes of the underground workings. He once appealed to King Edward and the Colonial Office, but his petition was ignored.

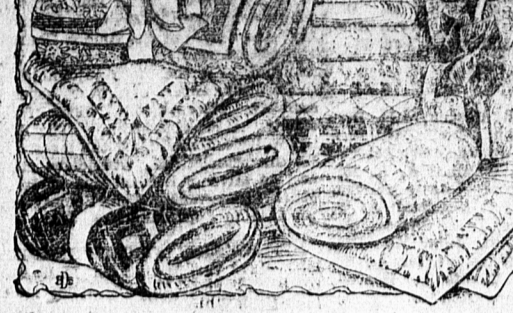
### TO SEARCH FOR MISSING SCHOONER.
