

MARITIME KEEN CONTESTS IN RECORDS BROKEN ALL EVENTS

The Labor Sports at the C. A. A. Grounds are most Successful in Every Respect

JONES AND HALPENNY ESTABLISH NEW RECORDS.

The Largest Crowd of Spectators in the History of the Association—R. A. Donahoe wins the All Round Medal—The Labor Men Parade in the Forenoon.

That Charlottetown has good reason to be proud of her athletes was again convincingly shown in the Labor sports yesterday. Deprived of competition in the M. P. A. A. sports at Moncton without frisking Island athletes by the arbitrary action of the M. P. A. A. our boys went in to convince the provinces that they were well able to maintain the proud reputation they have won as Maritime champions during the past two years and as a result two new maritime records were established one was equalled and the work in the other events with the exception of the middle distance runs was in advance of what has been shown during the past season in Nova Scotia or New Brunswick.

The grand stand was filled and the fences were lined with spectators who applauded generously the various performances. And all were deserving for such exhibitions of pluck and grit have rarely been seen by Charlottetown people.

The games were run off without any delay and the officials are to be congratulated and are entitled to the thanks of all in attendance for the promptness shown during the afternoon. Though the program was a long one, the last event was concluded shortly after five o'clock, and throughout there were no tiresome delays, as is customary at athletic meets.

The largest crowd that has ever assembled on the C. A. A. grounds, was present when the Hundred Yards Run was pulled off at 1.30, and during the afternoon the ticket sellers were kept busy. This fact goes to show that sport is by no means dead in Charlottetown and proves that had the M. P. A. A. held their meets in this City in the past on a holiday, as they did this year with Moncton, the attendance would not have been so small, and the local association would not have lost money. It is a good thing for the Abegweit that the M. P. A. A. has at last established a precedent in the matter of holiday meets, and when it is next Charlottetown's turn, the A. C. A. C. may hope for better luck.

The most interesting were the 100 and 220 yds. dashes, the mile run, the pole vault and the bicycle events. In the "hundred" the four runners in the final got away well together, but Donahoe came strong at the finish and won by a foot in the excellent time of 10 seconds, equalling the M. P. A. record with McMillan second, Duffy third. The same three fought the "220," but Duffy had the lead at the turn and though Donahoe made a strong effort in the stretch he had to be second place by a yard. This race was run without lines. In the pole vault, Halpenny, the "boy wonder" cleared the

tops of the uprights with apparent ease—20 ft. 4 inches—breaking the M. P. A. record. There was no means of ascertaining how high he could go. Donahoe's broad jump of 20 ft. 8 1/2 inches against a strong wind was remarkable, as was also Jones's hammer throw which broke the M. P. A. record. Brown won all the bicycle races as he pleased.

Headed by the band of the Fourth Regiment, the labourers paraded in the forenoon about three hundred strong. They presented a very creditable appearance in their new uniforms. In the afternoon they paraded to the athletic grounds in a body.

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THE LINA MAY OF SOURIS THE WINNER

The Boat Owned by Harry C McLean Retains the Cup

CHICAGO'S CELEBRATION WINS ON ALLOWANCE.

A Good Breeze blowing at First Turns to Almost Calm during the Afternoon.

After two unsuccessful attempts during the previous days to finish within the time allowance decided upon by the judges, it was abolished and the boats entered for the Souris regatta started again on Saturday at half past eleven in the forenoon.

The start was an excellent one, the Defender crossing the line first closely followed by the Lina May with the Shamrock third, and the others bunched together a little distance in the rear.

The breeze was blowing freshly and the Defender continued to gain upon the others and when she crossed the starting point upon the first lap she was well in the lead.

Soon after, however, the wind began to lighten and as the calm struck the leading boat first the others gained greatly upon her.

None, however, succeeded in overhauling her and she crossed the line first at 5.30, followed a moment later by the Lina May and Anita.

The latter, however, had a time allowance of fifty-five seconds and upon this she won the race and the Summerside boat was put back to third place. The Mamie C. was fourth and the Learig fifth. The remainder did not finish owing to lack of wind.

The regatta was not as largely attended as on the previous days, many of the visitors owing to the postponements having returned to their homes.

Mr. McLeod and the people of Souris are to be congratulated upon the success of their boat which has proven herself to be an excellent one.

The admirers of the Summerside yacht are anxious for another meeting and a contest in Charlottetown during the present month would prove an admirable attraction for exhibition week.

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
