REACH AN AGREEMENT ON WATERWAY TO SEA

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 13.—Out of the conference held the past three days at Detroit, Mich., by the American and Canadian members of the joint engineering board of the St. Lawrence River waterway commission a complete agreement on the engineering phases of the international seaway is expected to result, according to officials of the government here who are in touch with the matter.

Present at the Detroit meeting were Major-General Edgar Jadwin, chief of Engineers, Colonel William Kelly of Buffalo, and Lieutenant-Colonel G. B. Pillsbury of Detroit, the three American members, and D. W. McLachlan, General William Mitchell and O. O. LeFebvre, the Canadian members. Each of these engineers has been investigating for several months certain phases of the engineering work that will be required should the great Lakes-St. Lawrence waterway be agreed upon, and the Detroit meeting was arranged so that final efforts should be made to reach an understanding to compose the views of the engineers of the two countries on the major issues involved.

Officials of the engineers' staff of the war department said today that General Jadwin before leaving for Detroit expressed the opinion that the final touches would be made to the engineering difficulties and that upon the compilation of the report on the engineering questions involved in the waterway would be started for submission later to the two governments.
