

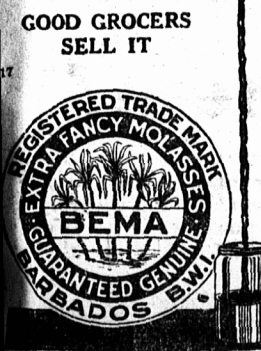

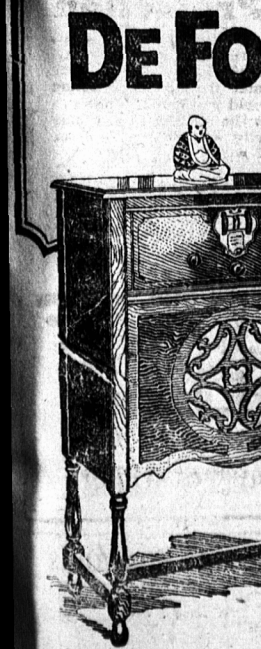

Rev. Mr. Lamont Preaches in Gaelic AT DEDICATION OF NEW PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH AT SYDNEY, C. B.

The new church built by the Presbyterians of Sydney was dedicated on Sunday last. It is computed that 5000 people were present, while, as many more could not gain admission, the church being surrounded by a park of over a hundred cars which had brought people from all parts of Cape Breton.

The special preacher for the day was the Rev. W. Orr Mulligan of the Presbyterian Church of Halifax, and a special feature of the afternoon service was a five minutes sermon in Gaelic preached by the Rev. D. M. Lamont well-known in Prince Edward Island. With regard to the latter the Halifax Chronicle says: "Although probably not more than one in ten of those present knew enough of the language to understand what was said, the sonorous notes of the dignified, white-haired orator created an impression that was felt almost as deeply by the Sassenach as by his Highland neighbor, showing that the old language is far from dying out even among the church could be seen glancing eyes, and here and there among the older people, honest tears fell unashamed as the long unused phrases brought half forgotten memories of long ago when Gaelic was the rule and not the exception in the religious services of Cape Breton."

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The Rev. W. Orr Mulligan of Sydney Mines also took part in the service, and among the congratulatory telegrams was one from the Rev. W. Bruce Muir, moderator of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island. The offering for the day amounted to \$4,327. This new church will be looked upon as the Cathedral Church of Presbyterianism in Cape Breton.



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
