The recommendations of Commander Wakeman for the shortening of the lobster fishing season has been rejected by the fisheries committee of the commons at Ottawa, on the ground that it would too seriously disturb the industry. A very radical recommendation is made that all along the coast, except in the counties of St. John and Charlotte, New Brunswick, the size limit to be abolished. In St. John and Charlotte the limit will be ten and a half inches. It was recommended that in 1911 new trap regulations be enforced which would prevent too many small lobsters being taken. It was recommended that the slots of traps be not less than an inch and a quarter apart and the mesh of the net at either end be not less than three and a half inches.

BIG SHIPMENT OF COTTON FOR HAVRE SEIZED AT MOBILE.

MOBILE, Ala., April 24—The first seizure of cotton shipped under bills of lading issued by Knight, Yancey & Company were made at Mobile today when Deputy United States Marshal White issued an injunction on Captain Arthur Parker, of the British steamer Meltonian, restraining the movement of 4,200 bales of cotton, loaded in the steamship and consigned to Havre, France. The injunction was issued by the United States district court for the southern district of Alabama on Saturday night on the application of Attorney J. C. Rich, acting for Clarence E. Frost, and W. S. Lowell, receivers for the bankrupt cotton company.
