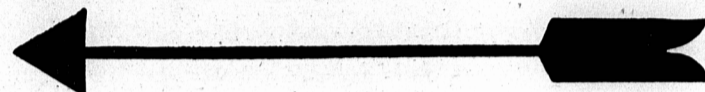
We regret to report the continued very painful illness of Mrs. David Sencabaugh from inflammatory rheumatism.

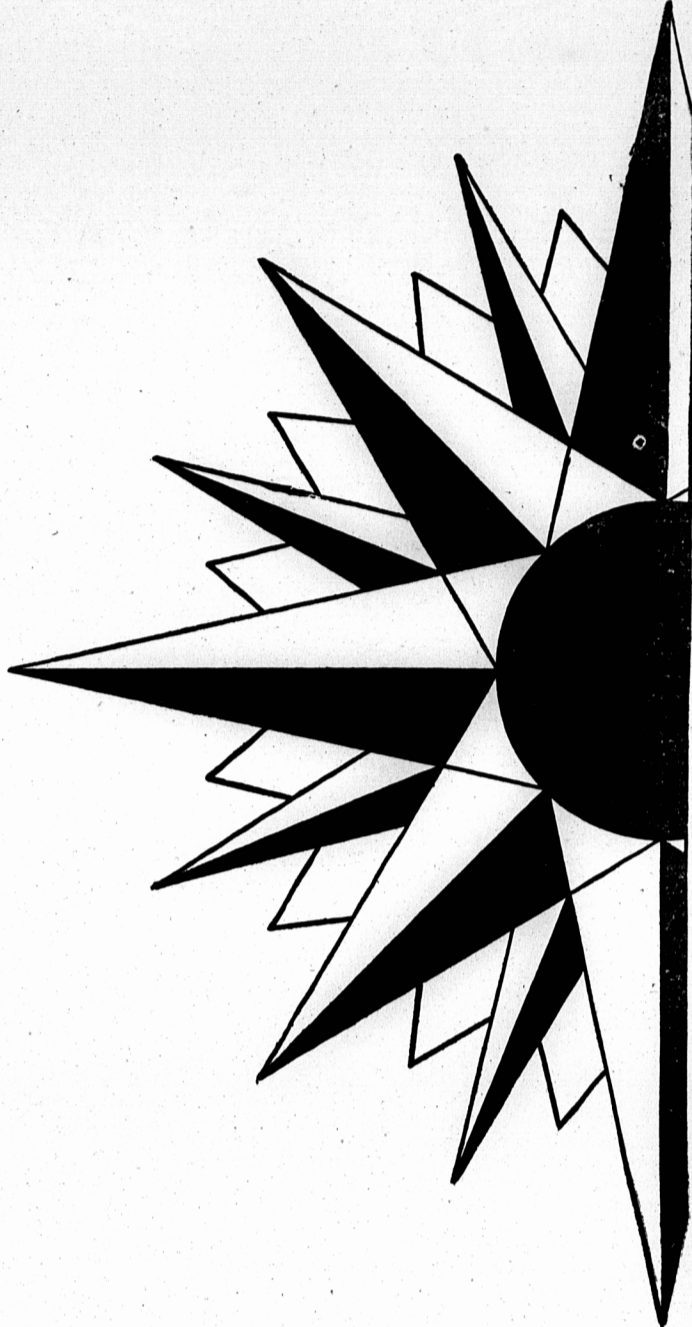
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
