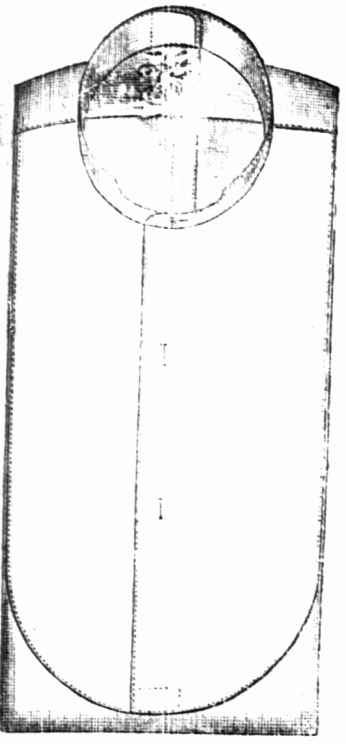

AN American transportation schooner arrived in Pictou yesterday from Detroit for coal and water, and will leave for New York as soon as fitted out.

MR. CHAS. MCGREGOR was sworn in as Water Commissioner yesterday. It is rather a singular occurrence that a year ago, to the day, the other commissioners were sworn in.

THE Tribune Nelson, B. C. of May 10 says: The sale of the Victoria block, at the corner of Baker and Josephine streets, was completed yesterday. W. J. G. Dickson acted for the vendors. Beer Brothers, and J. Laing Stocks for the purchasers. The prices paid is not made public, but it is said to be in the neighborhood of \$30,000. This is the highest price paid for a single piece of town property in Kootenay. The frame part of the block was erected in 1892 by John Houston, Charles H. Ink and G. A. Bigelow at a cost of \$9100, they having paid Mill Brothers \$4000 for the ground. Houston and Ink disposed of their interest in the block to Bigelow, taking electric light stock as part payment, and Bigelow sold out to Beer Brothers about a year ago for \$13,000. They built a brick addition at a cost of about \$6000 and made other alterations, the property standing them at about \$20,000. It rents for \$400 a month. It is considered the best piece of property in Nelson, or for that matter in Kootenay.

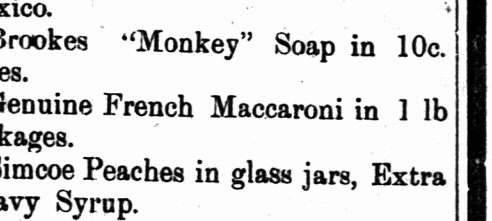

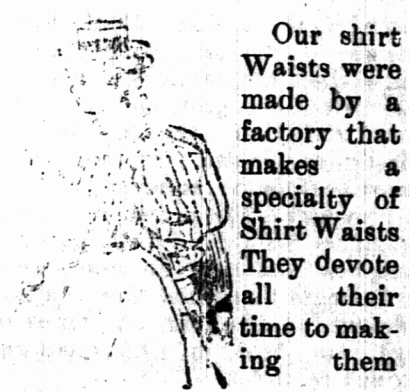

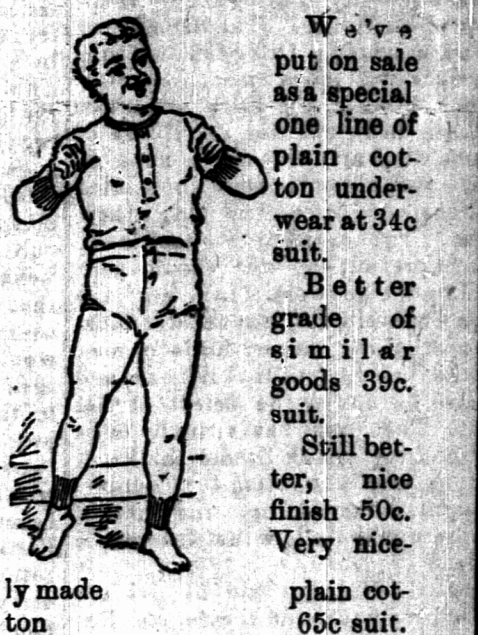
