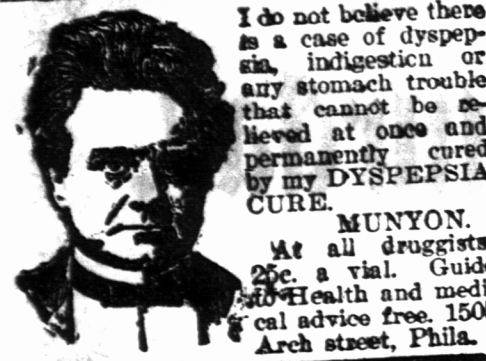

IN THE MATTER OF JUDGES.

It seems to be a defect of our system that while the Provinces regulate their own courts the federal authority appoints the judges and provides their salaries and expenses. Just now Quebec has called for three more Judges and it seems to be taken for granted that the Federal Parliament is in some manner obligated to appoint and provide for them. The Opposition dissent from this view, and intimate that the Liberal Governments of Quebec and the Dominion are providing needless places and salaries for their friends.

We have already so many Judges in Canada that we may well pause to consider the danger of their number being increased from time to time in this way. There are in the first place six Judges of the Supreme Court of Canada, and a Judge of the Exchequer Court, making seven federal Judges.

Ontario has four high Courts—a Court of Appeal with five Judges, a Court of Queen's Bench with three Judges, a High Court of Common Pleas with three and a High Court of Chancery with four Judges, a total of fifteen. Besides there are some 67 County Court Judges in Ontario.

Quebec has no County Courts, but has a formidable number of Superior Court Judges. Its Court of Queen's Bench has six Judges, and the Superior Court no fewer than thirty-one Judges. But in the absence of County Courts it can hardly be said that Quebec is so fully stocked with Courts as is Ontario.

Nova Scotia has a Supreme Court of six members and seven County Court Judges. New Brunswick has a Supreme Court of six and six County Court Judges. In Prince Edward Island we have half as many of each class as New Brunswick. Manitoba has a Court of Queen's Bench of four Judges and six County Court Judges. British Columbia has five Supreme Court and five County Judges. The Territories have a Supreme Court of five.

Including the Federal Courts we have here 88 Judges of Federal and Superior Provincial Courts, and 94 County Court Judges, a total of 182 Judges. It is a rather formidable array, and the salary list runs up to over \$700,000 yearly. The Quebec salary list is less than a quarter of the total and the population of Quebec is considerably more than one-fourth of the Dominion.

Out of seventy odd Liberal members present when the "emergency rations" matter was voted upon in the Commons there were ten or eleven who were not satisfied with the majority report. But little more than half the members were in their places, and it is hinted that some dissatisfied Liberals avoided the vote, which seems not to be improbable. The incident serves to show that there is still some independence among party men, and it will afford a wholesome warning to heads of departments that watchful care over the doings of their subordinates is expected and will be insisted upon.

In another column of this issue we give the opinions of a Boxer on the present trouble in China. In the midst of the cruel massacres going on in that country it is rather chilling to read the cold-blooded reasoning of this clear-headed Oriental, but it serves to show us how far the East is from the West in modes of thinking and in practice.

The Government of Canada appear to have a real surplus this year and a big one. Just how big it is has not been settled, but we are assured that it is big enough to cover the expenditure for capital account during the year and still leave a margin for the reduction of the debt. This is good news for every body in Canada.
