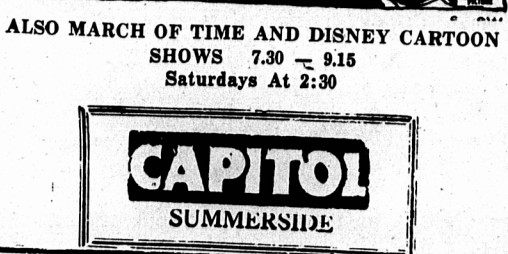

Killed In Action

Mr. A. M. Nicholson, M.P. for MacKenzie, spoke at a public meeting in the Summerside Town Hall last evening in the interests of the C.C.F. party. He advised the people of this Province to form their own C.C.F. clubs and train their own leaders. He said that the C.C.F. party may form the next federal government as they are given excellent chances of having the largest group after the next election. In any event the C.C.F. will, in the not too distant future, form a government and when that time comes they would like to have an Island representative on the West of Quebec C.C.F. is faithfully supporting a system which in commencing his speech Mr. Nicholson said that he was down here to meet the supporters of the C.C.F. in the Maritimes. The party is not discouraged by the results of recent elections here. He is the only party which has gained in New Brunswick when they polled 14 per cent of the popular vote. He said that in the C.C.F. party is handicapped by lack of funds and sympathetic press.

Dealing with the general principles of the party he said that they favor central planning for peace time similar to that during the war. The Liberals and Conservatives support a system which in peace time is never able to distribute fairly the available goods. The Government must have complete control of the banking system so that whatever financial policy is made is financially possible. At the conclusion of his speech Mr. Nicholson offered to answer questions and in response to one question he said that the C. C. F. never intended to take over the farms. In Saskatchewan the Government is composed of seventy-five per cent of farmers and it is ridiculous to suggest that they would pass legislation to take the farms from the owners. The C. C. F. law is not to take over the farms in a position so that their standard of living will compare favorably with other occupations.—8.
