THERE was a very large attendance at the meeting of the Prince Edward Island Fish and Game Protection Association held last night in the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court room. Delegates were present from Kings and Prince Counties who took part in framing and adopting a constitution and bylaws which would be satisfactory to the Island at large. The greatest enthusiasm prevailed, every one present seeming desirous of the constitution and by laws being made as perfect as possible, every body present seemed imbued with the one idea that the fish and game of this province must be protected. The members of the Association fearlessly pledged themselves to report every case of illegal fishing or shooting that came to their notice and expressed their desire that their intention so to do should be generally known. After the passing several motions were made.

Among others, J. M. Davison, Esq., Cashier Merchants Bank of P. E. I., was unanimously appointed Treasurer of the Association. The executive were appointed a committee to draw up amendments and additions to the game and fisheries laws that appear to be necessary in order that the same may be presented to the Federal and Local Governments. String addresses having been made by a number of gentlemen present the meeting was adjourned till Friday, Sept. 15.

IN THE PROBATE COURT

For the last three days the will of the late William Welsh has been before the Probate Court for Proof in Solemn Form. These proceedings were taken by the Executors as a result of the filing of a caveat in the Probate Office by James E. Welsh, brother of the deceased, against the granting of Probate to the Executors. When the matter came up for hearing it transpired that one of the two witnesses to the will was not adduced in evidence by the Executors and it was claimed on the part of the caveator that as no satisfactory explanation was given for the absence of such evidence, that the will was not sufficiently propounded so as to admit of probate being granted.

At noon yesterday the Judge of Probate delivered his judgment finding that the will was sufficiently proved and stated that he would proceed to grant probate. Before probate was granted, however an appeal to the Supreme Court was taken and the necessary papers, filed in the Probate Office.

This operates as a stay of proceedings and the granting of probate will now be suspended till the matter is disposed of by the Supreme Court at the next Michaelmas term.
