Would Change Rule To Permit Amateur Tennis Players To Accept Money

(By Gayle Talbot, Associated Press Sports Writer) LONDON, Jan. 14.—Interpreted by close observers as a "last ditch" attempt to keep their star performer, Fred Perry, from turning professional, the British Lawn Tennis Association today voted to support a motion before the International Federation which would permit amateurs to accept money for making action motion pictures.

The motion, made by the Czechoslovakian Association, would delete the International Federation rule which reads: "Amateur regulations: An amateur lawn tennis player is specifically prohibited from gaining pecuniary advance by (1) posing for or permitting the taking of lawn tennis action film pictures of himself," etc.

The move to rescind the Federation rule is in the formative stage, since it requires the support of member nations comprising at least 15 votes in the federation to call an extraordinary session of the body 10 weeks before the motion can be passed.

Desilets Given Permission To Join Tecumsehs
