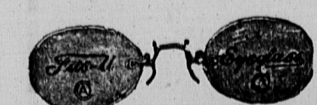

Irish Accept Invitation To London Conferences

LONDON, Oct. 1.—Eamon de Valera today sent a communication to Mr. Lloyd George accepting the invitation to a conference in London, October 11th, with a view to a settlement of the Irish question.

"We received your letter of invitation to a conference in London, October 11th, with a view to ascertaining how the association of Ireland with the community of nations known as the British Empire may best be reconciled with Irish national aspirations," said Mr. de Valera in his reply.

"Our respective positions have been stated and understood, and we agree that conference, not correspondence is the most practical and hopeful way to an understanding."

"We accept the invitation. Our delegates will meet you in London on the date mentioned, and explore every possibility of a settlement by personal discussion."

Belfast Skeptical. BELFAST, Oct. 1.—Fear that a solution of the Irish controversy may not be reached at the London conference on October 11 should the British government's invitation be accepted by the Sinn Fein, was expressed by the Northern Whigs today.

In commenting upon Premier Lloyd George's latest note to Dublin, the newspaper said: "Lloyd George has not permanently averted a grave crisis in the peace negotiations by his reply. Unless some one is prepared to make a very big surrender, he has only postponed it. The course adopted by the British government is open to criticism on various grounds. It may be condemned as undignified and lacking in courage, and therefore unworthy of the rulers of a great empire."

The Irish News says: "In the days to come, October 11, 1921, will be associated with the beginning of another epoch of Irish history, provided the present crisis is handled skillfully and boldly, with an honest regard for the expressions of sincerity in the desire for peace, with which the protracted correspondence has been studied all along."

THE MARKETS

There were 2807 cattle, 4470 calves, 14799 sheep and lambs and 3227 hogs, on sale on the two markets during the week and 2889 cattle on through billing, principally for export.

The bulk of the stock was dumped on Monday's market and as packers had been receiving quite liberal supplies in the way of direct shipments during the previous week there was a severe cut in prices all along the line. The class of stock escaped and grass calves suffered the most.

Prices were further in the case of cattle, owing to the fact that a very large percentage of the cattle offered were of very fair butcher quality making too much of one kind of stock.

Butchers' cattle were sold generally for \$3.50 to \$5.50, top steers around \$6.00. In the canner class light common bulls brought \$2.90 to \$2.50, and heavier bulls weighing around 1200 and over averaged close to \$2.85. Poor thin old cows \$1.00 and better grades of cutters up to \$2.50.

Real good veal calves remained fairly firm in comparison with other stock. By the close of the week these were in good demand at \$9.00 to \$10.00, or even \$11.00 for real tops. Grass calves fell to \$2.50 for the bulk of sales with some sales as low as \$2.00.

Lambs suffered in price almost as much as grass calves selling at a top of \$7.00 and \$7.25, compared to \$8.00 and \$8.25 on the previous week's markets. The lowest for lambs was \$5.00, sheep remained at \$2.00 to \$4.00.

Sales of hogs were made at \$9.00 to \$10.00 per hundred for hogs of quality. Prices within this range were paid for hogs of equal quality and it is doubtful if the average price for the week would be much over \$9.50. Sows and heavies were sold for \$8.00 to \$8.00, the latter price being paid by local butchers.

Minard's Linctant for Colds Etc.

Newfoundland Independent of Fordney Tariff

HALIFAX, N. S., Oct. 2.—If the United States want to cut its own throat to the extent of jeopardizing a twenty million dollar export trade to Newfoundland by prohibiting a three million dollar import trade from there then let them go ahead with the Fordney Tariff Bill," said Sir Richard Squires, Premier of Newfoundland here last night on his way home from New York and Washington, where he had conferences regarding proposed high tariff bill which would shut out Newfoundland fish from the United States.

"The Ancient Colony," he said, "sells only about \$3,000,000 worth of goods altogether to the States, while it consumes \$20,000,000 worth of American goods yearly. A protective tariff, Premier Squires said: "It may be good for a country wishing to keep others out of its home market, but if export trade is wanted, a free trade policy such as Britain has had for generations is a necessity."

W. PETERBORO NAMES BURNHAM

PETERBORO, Ont., Sept. 28.—At tonight's meeting of West Peterboro Conservative Association, J. H. Burnham, ex-M. P., was selected to represent the Conservative party in the coming Federal election. Three candidates were nominated in the following order: J. H. Burnham, R. Denne and J. F. Strickland. Mr. Denne, who ran as a Government candidate last February, declined the nomination, and declared he would support the choice of the meeting. A standing vote failed to decide the issue, and a ballot was taken with the above result. The meeting, which was representative, pledged its support to the successful candidate and endorsed a resolution of confidence in Premier Meighen and his tariff policy. At the by-elections in Peterboro had five candidates in the field. This time it will be a straight fight between Mr. Burnham and Mr. Gordon. M. P. The latter represents the Liberal interests here. The Conservative officers were elected by the association: President, Dr. Morrison; vice-president, J. Lynch; second vice-president, Mrs. Charles Wright; third vice-president, W. H. Langford; secretary, G. McElherry; assistant secretary, J. W. Worth; treasurer, W. J. Howden.

C. P. R. President On Immigration

SASKATOON, Sept. 30.—Establishment of an immigration policy which will permit free entry of the right type of immigrants and the selection of immigrants by agents in foreign countries, rather than the methods of selection at the ports of entry, was advocated this afternoon by E. W. Beatty, K. C., president of the Canadian Pacific Railway, in an interview granted just prior to leaving Saskatoon for Yorkton.

"Can you suggest a means of discriminating between desirable and undesirable immigrants—possibly a quota to be allowed each country, with Northern Europe favored, or something of that nature?" he was asked. "My suggestion would be a discriminating selection in the country from which the immigrant comes," he replied. "This should be done by the agent abroad and not at the ports of entry. This system is entirely wrong, and is, in my opinion, one of the worst features of the immigration system. There is no necessity of quotas, as yet, from any one country. I believe that we should take all we can get of the right type from all of the countries which have been sending us immigrants."

"Is the Canadian Pacific handicapped in its immigration work by present restrictions?" was the next question asked. "What would it desire in the form of conditions to make its immigration and colonization work done more successful? How much of this kind of work would it undertake if conditions were made right?" Mr. Beatty replied: "The Canadian Pacific is embarrassed by lack of a general immigration policy which would permit free entry of the right type of immigrant. We want a definite immigration policy prescribed by the Government within which the company's activities can be carried on. We have been the largest immigration and colonization agency up to the present, and have no intention of relaxing these efforts. We always plan to work in co-operation with the Government in extending our activities along these lines."

WINDSOR, Sept. 30.—Hon. Mr. MacKenzie King was welcomed in Hants County on his arrival here yesterday, at a mass meeting in the Drill Hall. The Liberal leader, Hon. H. S. Beland, M.P., William Duff, M.P., D. D. McKenzie, M.P., were the speakers addressing a capacity audience, and gave the people of the county their views on Liberalism and national affairs. Dr. J. S. Black, ex-M.P., presided at the meeting.
