### WOMEN'S INSTITUTE IN PRINCE EDWARD ISLAND

Up to November first, 1914, twenty-nine Institutes have been organized in Prince Edward Island. The following items may be of interest to all who are engaged in this noble work. The Institutes referred to have, as a general rule, done excellent work since organization and the outlook for 1915 is very encouraging.  
**NEW HAVEN INSTITUTE.** Organized June 7, 1913. Regular day of meeting is first Wednesday of each month at 4 p. m. in the schoolhouse. This Institute has held since organization eight meetings. Funds have been raised and expended on laying new floor in school, supplying covered drinking fountain to the school, also new shades. Donations of money have been given to St. Vincent and Mt. Herbert Orphanages. Red Cross Work is now being taken up and will probably be the main work for its members for some time to come. 16 members enrolled.  
**CORNWALL-YORK INSTITUTE.** Organized April 7, 1913. Thirty-three members enrolled. Regular day of meeting first Monday in each month at 3 p. m. Eighteen meetings held since organization. Funds raised by the Institute have been put towards painting and papering the Cornwall School as well as the York Point School and supplying these two schools with new window shades and covered drinking fountains; contributions to the Red Cross Relief amounting to \$27 out of the treasury and collected for the Women's Patriotic Association \$102.45; also clothing for the Red Cross Relief Fund.

**DARNEY INSTITUTE.** Organized April 19, 1913. Twenty-three members enrolled. Regular day of meeting second Wednesday in each month. Thirteen meetings have been held since organization. This Institute has laid a hardwood floor in the school, supplied drinking fountains and paid for having the schoolroom scrubbed regularly. It has also fitted new lamps to the Hall and contributed \$29 out of the Treasury for the Red Cross Society work as well as personal contributions to collectors for War Relief work. Members and non-members are working together in the interest of the Relief work. Eleven new members were added to the list in September.  
**MALPEQUE INSTITUTE.** Organized April 18th, 1913. Forty-six members enrolled. Regular day of meeting second Thursday in month at 7:30 p. m. Fifteen meetings have been held since organization. This Institute has in connection with its regular work as an Institute meetings, but is comprised of members of the Institute. These ladies make and sell the garments for the benefit of the treasury of the Institute. The funds of this Institute have gone toward school improvement, such as the furnishing of new desks in the Malpeque School as well as improvements in the Hamilton School, janitor service and scrubbing of schools. The district of Hamilton is included in this Institute, also representatives from Baltic.

**FRENCH RIVER INSTITUTE.** Organized April 22, 1913. Regular day of meeting 2nd Wednesday of month at 7:30 p. m. Fifteen meetings have been held since organization. Nine members enrolled. Funds expended toward painting inside walls of Hall at French River also for school at Park Corner as well as pump for same. This Institute includes Park Corner School district.  
**STERLING INSTITUTE.** This Institute includes Hope River, Stanley Bridge and Cavendish districts. It was organized on June 19th, 1913 and up to Nov. 1, 1914 had the membership of 34. The regular day of meeting is the third Thursday of each month at 2 o'clock and in winter time at 7 o'clock. Drinking fountains have been supplied to Hope River and Stanley Bridge School, as well as new window shades and window shades or Stanley School. The members of the enterprising Institute are fitting up a hall in a vacant house for the use of the Institute after which a programme will be planned for the winter work.

**LONG RIVER INSTITUTE.** Organized April 23, 1913. Ten members enrolled. Regular meeting of Institute held on the first Thursday of each month at 2 p. m. Fifteen meetings have been held since organization. Funds have been expended in supplying new curtains for stage in hall and new window shades for the same, also painting the outside of the Schoolhouse.  
**MARSHFIELD INSTITUTE.** Organized April, 1913. Twenty members enrolled. Regular day of meeting First Thursday in each month at 3 p. m. Twenty meetings have been held since organization. Funds have been given towards improvements in Hall and Red Cross Society work.

**NEW LONDON INSTITUTE.** Organized June 18, 1913. Eighteen members enrolled. Regular day of meeting Third Wednesday in each month. Thirteen meetings held since organization. Improvements to Public Hall and Red Cross Society work have taken the funds of the Institute. It is the intention of the Institute to raise funds this coming winter for the purpose of starting a library in the village. The school district of Campbellton and Graham's Road are included in this section.  
**LAKEVILLE INSTITUTE.** Including the school district of North Lake, Lakeville and Elmira, and organized July 22, 1914, this Institute has a membership of twenty-two and has since that time three meetings. The meetings are monthly and are held on the first Wednesday of each month in the evening. The most important work of this Institute is that of the Red Cross, but schools and school libraries will be given attention as well as the best way to economize in cooking and clothing during the present national struggles.

**NORBORO INSTITUTE.** Organized July 30, 1913, with a membership of 16. Regular day of meeting is the first Tuesday of each month at 8:30 in the schoolroom. Sixteen meetings have been held during that time and the interest is increasing. Drinking fountains and chairs have been given to the school by the Institute and it has also fenced the school grounds and pastured the fence posts.  
**ALPHA INSTITUTE.** Organized May 13, 1914. Twenty-one members enrolled. Regular day of meeting 2nd Wednesday of month at 7:30 p. m. Fifteen meetings have been held since organization. Nine members enrolled. Funds expended toward painting inside walls of Hall at French River also for school at Park Corner as well as pump for same. This Institute includes Park Corner School district.

**MONTAGUE INSTITUTE.** Organized April 7, 1913. Nineteen members enrolled. Regular day of meeting first Friday of each month. Six meetings have been held since organization. Funds devoted to school and Red Cross work.  
**ALPHA INSTITUTE.** This Institute was organized in April 1911 but only came under the directions of the Department of Agriculture in June 1914, since which it has held five meetings and has the membership of twenty-three. This Institute holds its regular meetings on the Third Thursday of each month and is devoting its attention to the School and Hall in its community as well as encouraging a higher standard in Household Science exhibits at the local exhibitions by giving cash prizes. The Hospital Ship Fund has also been contributed to by this Institute.

**SPRINGFIELD INSTITUTE.** Organized April 25, 1913. Twenty-eight members enrolled. Regular day of meeting the 3rd Friday in each month. Fifteen meetings held since organization. The funds have been placed toward School improvement as well as a goodly amount toward Red Cross Work.  
**EAST WILTSHIRE AND WARREN GROVE INSTITUTE.** Organized July 9, 1913. Nineteen members enrolled. Regular day of meeting second Wednesday in each month. Twelve meetings have been held since organization. This Institute painted the inside of the East Wiltshire Schoolhouse, supplied new shades for the windows, a new desk for the teacher and drinking fountain and cups for the children; also papered and cleaned the inside of the Warren Grove Schoolhouse and supplied fountain and drinking cups for the pupils of the same.  
**MEADOWBANK INSTITUTE.** Organized April 7, 1913. Sixteen members enrolled. Regular day of meeting first Tuesday in month at 3 o'clock. Have painted the walls and woodwork of the schoolhouse, whitened the ceiling, bought a tank for drinking water, paid for the work of laying a new hardwood floor in the schoolhouse and will help pay for materials. Put up shelves for window plants. Collected a substantial sum for the Red Cross Fund and also clothing for the
