THE PRICE OF RUBBER FOOTWEAR GOES UP

Since the first of the new year the rubber manufacturers have advanced the price on all rubber footwear in the United States and Canada from 15 to 20 per cent.

The cause of the advance is the high cost of cotton and other materials that go into the manufacture of rubber footwear, also the scarcity and high cost of labor which has made it very difficult to get out their orders on time. Orders that were placed last March have not all been delivered yet.

LOSS TO SCIENCE WHEN SHIP SANK

LAWRENCE, Kan., Jan. 26.—Two skeletons of the duck-billed dinosaur were lost to science when the sinking ship Mount Temple, according to Charles H. Sternberg of this city, who found the bones in the Red Deer country in Alberta, Canada. The prehistoric specimens were 32 feet long and were sent to the British museum in London. Mr. Sternberg said they weighed 20,000 lbs. When the ship sank they were packed in crates and were being shipped by Mr. Sternberg. Today he received a message from Canadian rail-road officials of the fate of the shipment.
