A LOCAL SUMMER HOTEL.

The destruction of the Acadia Hotel by fire, while it reduces the accommodation for summer tourists and is in many other ways regrettable, appears to have given a new impetus to the desirable project of a summer hotel in the near vicinity of Charlottetown. There is increasing talk along this line of late and it bids fair to lead to practical results. The advantages would be many, as can easily be seen.

Among these advantages one of the first to strike the mind is the longer season which the south shore affords as compared with the north shore of the Island. The weather is comfortable at the seashore considerably earlier in the spring and later in the fall in the vicinity of Charlottetown than it is on the north shore. It may be admitted that it is not quite so cool in August, but it is in most summers cool enough for those who come from the heated inland or more southern latitudes. The lengthened season would prove of great advantage to the hotel as a business enterprise.

There would be other advantages, among which would be convenience of access for tourists arriving in the city by water or rail; facility of access to the Charlottetown market for supplies; facilities for small shopping, which all tourists find necessary from time to time; quick access by guests to the principal centre of trade, of news, to the banks, express office, telegraph, and with the best medical, or legal skill the Island affords—the best preaching too, on Sundays—opportunity to visit the golf or tennis grounds, or the theatre from time to time, and with boats, or livery horses available in greater numbers than elsewhere.

In fact with a well-equipped and well-managed summer hotel near Charlottetown, tourist guests could combine all the advantages of town and country, the seclusion, the beautiful surroundings and pure air of the country, with the comforts and conveniences of suburban residence. Such a hotel if once erected could be managed as a separate enterprise, or in connection with one or other of our excellent leading city hotels. It would be of great advantage to the city in many ways, notably by increasing trade and travel, and would benefit the railway, steamship and livery business also.

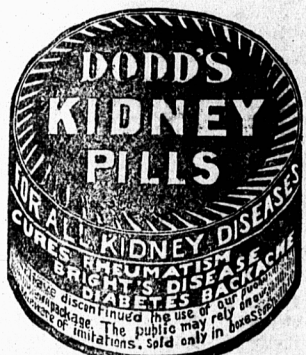
Already the question of location has been mooted and various sites have been spoken of as desirable. Among other places Rocky Point, Keppock and Langley's Beach, just across the harbor, have been mentioned. Each of these has its attractions, its own local setting and command of view. The Hillsborough bridge by the facilities it gives for crossing at all hours, and as an attractive carriage drive, might probably turn the scale in favor of one of the two latter.

Any one who has stood on the Langley shore on a calm summer evening must have been impressed with the extent and the rare beauty of the view afforded. In front is our splendid harbor and beyond it the fair city with its public edifices and spires. To the right, looking up the harbor, is our million dollar bridge, the shining river beyond and the fair shores of Belvidere and Falconwood. Turning to the left, Victoria Park, with its many attractions is in full view. A little further to the left the entrances of the North and West Rivers are seen and the smiling homesteads beyond. Across the

harbor entrance is the historic site of Fort La Jolie and the Block House. Close in front steamers and sail craft come and go as they enter or leave the harbor. The seaward view is simply magnificent, embracing St. Peter's and Governor's Islands, and the more distant shores of Cumberland and Picou. One might travel a thousand miles to find so many attractive features in one view.

There are in fact many pretty spots fairly suitable for the new hotel and those who undertake the enterprise will naturally seek the most attractive. The main thing is that the undertaking shall go forward without needless delay. We regard it as a promising venture financially. The tourist trade is yearly expanding and with the ever growing population of the west and south must continue to expand. Climate does not change materially or permanently. The west and south will always be too hot in summer and our cool breezes and bathing beaches will be increasingly popular. It is prudent and judicious to prepare for this harvest, so easily within our reach.

White coal is the pretty name given to water powers that are producing light, heat and motive force by generating electricity. Thus Niagara may prove as useful to Ontario as the best coal mine, and many other water falls in Canada are being turned to account for like purposes. Among the latest schemes is one to utilize the stupendous tides at the head of the Bay of Fundy. An American company proposes by a series of dams across the river Tantramar, near Sackville, to catch the incoming tide in a big reservoir and utilize the water by means of turbine wheels as it passes to a huge discharge basin. If the enterprise succeeds, the plan will be applied to other tidal rivers flowing into the Bay and may mean much for the future of Maritime industries. The eastern Provinces have plenty of black coal, and if to this they can add cheap and abundant "white coal" their future progress in manufacturing will be assured.
