Railroad Files Bankruptcy Suit

(By The Associated Press) CLEVELAND, Jan. 18 — Historic Erie Railroad, first in the United States to connect the Great Lakes with the Atlantic, sought the bankruptcy way out of its financial woes today.

Unable to meet more than \$2,000,000 in immediate indebtedness, the road asked a district court to oversee its operations through a trusteeship. This action will make all its disbursements subject to court control, and may result in scaling down fixed charges of about \$14,000,000 annually.

The road's directors, meeting in Cleveland's terminal tower, reached their decision in a half-hour and bonds plummeted on stock
