C. held in Ottawa the farmers position was presented by Mrs. Campbell of Ontario, one of the C. P. A. directors. As a result they decided not to send their lawyer to oppose the farmers on the Privy Council margarine appeal. They also passed resolutions urging investigation of the high price of margarine and other non-agricultural commodities, to make a study of all producer plans for orderly marketing with the object of gaining a better understanding of what farm producers are trying to

do, recognizing the need for orderly distribution of food and welcoming the efforts of producers to have an international clearing house set up for distributing food commodities. This is another instance why farm people must organize and be in a position to protect their interests and present their views to other groups and industries. Farm Forum Six very successful rallies were held last week to arrange for the setting up of discussion groups throughout the Island. The Federation is now the clearing house and promotional headquarters for this type of work. Activities so far indicate a most active and successful

season in discussion group work. Our Provincial Farm Forum Committee met Monday afternoon. Arrangements were made to help community leaders to organize new groups and hold follow-up meetings in school districts and similar centres during the past few weeks. It is evident that our organizations must have an active and informed membership if they are to develop and function properly. There is definite progress being made in this regard. We can all spend some real pleasant evenings by organizing and holding a Farm Forum meeting each Monday night for the winter months.
