Million Chinese Facing Famine

SIANFU, Shensi Province, China, March 22—Widespread famine became an ally of the Nanking Government today in its campaign to drive an estimated 250,000 Communists from the northern part of this Central China province.

Hemmed in on three sides by Nanking forces, the Communist army's only escape was into Inner Mongolia, where, it was said, food is even more scarce than in Shensi.

Northern Shensi is principally mountainous country, produces barely enough food for the normally small population. The invaders, it was pointed out here, placed too great a burden on the countryside. The provincial government, to forestall possible disorders, appropriated \$200,000 for relief.

The provincial famine relief bureau estimated 4,000,000 persons were in acute need of food within an area of 40,000 square miles. It was estimated that 1,000,000 were doomed unless rain came to the parched area within a fortnight.

Large Increase In Bacon Exports

Increasing quantities of Canadian bacon are being consumed in Great Britain. Imports increased from 49,495 cwt. in 1931 to 1,092,401 cwt. for last year, an increase of 2,107.09 per cent. Imports of Canadian hams show an increase of 45.6 per cent last year over the previous year, 277,724 cwt. being imported in 1936, according to the agricultural department of the Canadian National Railways. The United States, the largest supplier, accounted for 332,840 cwt. Total imports amounted to 671,764 cwt.

SHORT CUTS WITH SCISSORS

It saves time and trouble to hang a large pair of stainless scissors on a handy hook in the kitchen.

There'll be no accidents with fingers, and kitchen knives and cumbersome chopping boards can be done away with.

Raisins and glace cherries, candied peel, grated carrot and nuts that go to make cakes and puddings—scissors will cut them up in next to no time.

Then take breakfast bacon rashers; their rinds can be trimmed as neat as a shingle with a pair of scissors. Carrots, pimento, turnips, parsnips, potatoes—a deft clipping does them speedily, or shapes them artistically into stars and diamonds for garnishing.

Scissors make short work, too, of meat for a stew, trimming cutlets and cutting up filleted fish for such things as souffles, pies and scallop shells. They will nip off fish heads, tails and fins and grate chocolate coarsely.

Hold parsley, mint and herbs in a tight bunch and snip them to fine pieces; watercress, endive, greens of any kind—call the scissors into service to slice them up conveniently. Shred lettuce, too, by setting scissors to work on a thick sheaf of leaves tightly rolled.

Make light labor of marmalade by snapping at orange and lemon rinds with scissors. Snip round the core of a halved grapefruit, then dig down and cutting out from underneath, leave a pool of juice for the maraschino cherry. Cut down the sections and sides to finish the job.

Trim the rough edges of fruit tarts with scissors. Use them to fashion petals and leaves to decorate pies.

When, from sheer hard work the blades are blunted let them try to bite the neck off a glass bottle. See that the full length of the blades saws at the glass 20 to 25 times. They'll be sharper.

Cutting coarse sandpaper puts tired scissors on edge, too. If it puts your teeth on edge also, take it to be ground.

WOULD PRESERVE FOSSIL AREAS

DRUMHELLER, Alta., March 22—An active campaign for the establishment of a prehistoric park zone between Stevesville and Big Valley, near here, with a view to preserving important fossil beds is being conducted by the Drumheller Board of Trade.

In this district 50 odd species of the dinosaur have been found. Some species were traced to herbivorous varieties and others to carnivorous families. Among types definitely identified were the chasmosaurus, bonotosaurus, tyrannosaurus and gorgosaurus. They ranged from the size of a garden lizard to 100 feet in length, judging from the remains found.

Board of trade members said hundreds of tons of these valuable remains had already been unearthed by enterprising strangers and sent to far corners of the world. Red Deer river dinosaurs are exhibited at the British Museum in London and also in Berlin.

Fossilized remains of centuries-old trees can be seen without much searching in almost any direction from Drumheller.

BREAD 25 CENTS AT GOLDFIELDS

GOLDFIELDS, Sask., March 22—As a result of the early freeze-up last fall necessitating aerial transportation prices of foodstuffs in this northern mining town have touched new high levels.

Flour costs \$14 a hundredweight, bread 25 cents a loaf, sugar 20 cents a pound, butter 50 cents; eggs 75 cents a dozen; milk 25 cents a tin, or in powder form 60 cents a pound. Honey, dates and raisins are 30 cents a pound and four-pound tins of jam are \$1.25. Chocolate bars at three for a quarter are in heavy demand. Residents pay an extra nickel over "outside prices" on every newspaper or magazine bought and the same on each packet of cigarettes.

Nevertheless Goldfield has needed no relief and no person has gone hungry unless it has been for fresh fruits and green vegetables which have not been available. Virtually every man is employed either in the mines, the lumber camps or on traplines.

Planes did not reach here until early December after the freeze-up and at that time food was becoming scarce, but had been augmented

ed by the heavy caribou run. A rate of eight cents a pound was struck for air freight over the 90 miles from the ice-locked supply-carrying barge on Lake Athabasca.
