DEFIED YELLOW FLAG.

Clergymen Officiated at the Burial of W. Woodbury Wells, M. P., in Spite of Smallpox.

The Amherst correspondent of the Halifax Chronicle writes:

It is seldom that circumstances so sad attend the burial of our lamented dead as those which occurred at the funeral of the late W. W. Wells, M. P., of Westmead Co., on Thursday. Some of his friends from the smallpox infected districts had visited the bereaved family. The health officers hearing of it, immediately quarantined the house, and when the clergymen who were to perform the last sad rites arrived they found the premises in charge of the officers, the yellow flag flying, and the friends in large numbers standing at a safe distance.

The clergymen were forbidden to enter, but seeing it was of absolute necessity that they do so, Rev. D. A. Steele, D. D., and Rev. E. Chapman, D. D., insisted on going in, when they found the family almost heartbroken at what they in their grief and bereavement considered arbitrary precautions. The clergymen reasoned with them, explaining, the necessity of every precaution being taken to prevent the introduction of smallpox into the district. They then held a short funeral service, in which Rev. M. Howard of Bay Vert joined.

The reverend gentlemen assisted by the deceased's brother, A. J. Wells, removed the remains to the hearse. Much sympathy is expressed for the aged parents, who in addition to losing an honored and worthy son were unable to have their most intimate friends visit them and express words of comfort and sympathy.

It is rarely that clergymen have to take matters into their own hands in this way but the gentlemen who did so deserve the greatest gratitude and honor of all for their conduct under the circumstances.

DENOUNCES CREMATION.

Priest Says The Practice is Not Approved by His Church.

The recent organization of societies in this city for the purpose of spreading the practice of cremation has caused considerable discussion among Catholics as to whether cremation is in accordance with the laws of the Catholic Church. Catholics desiring to join these societies have sought the advice of their pastors. In nearly all cases the priests have advised against cremation on ground that it is not consistent with the rites of the Church.

In reply to the question as to whether one might join a society for the spread of cremation and whether it was lawful to leave instructions for turning one's body, the Rev. Father F. M. Kielty, pastor of Holy Angels Church, says:

"I answer no, because Pope Leo XIII., in his decree issued at Rome in 1883, calls cremation a 'detestable abuse for burning the bodies of the dead.' These words imply something grave. Those who wish their dead bodies to be burned, must for that reason be deprived of a Christian burial, which penalty supposes a very grave offence.

"The teaching of the Church is opposite to cremation. There is nothing intrinsically wrong in burning the dead. The practice might become necessary at times of excessive mortality, after battle or during a plague. In ordinary times, however, cremation disturbs the pious sentiments of the faithful. It is not in keeping with the impressive rites of Christian burial. It has been introduced by men possessed of doubtful faith, who seek to make popular the pagan custom of cremation and thereby shut out the Church from one of her most touching functions. These reasons justify the condemnation of cremation by the Church, I have no desire to go into the various sanitary, legal and economical arguments for or against cremation."

Record Bicycle Riding.

SPRINGFIELD, January 11.—Walter L. Stannard of this city has won the world's bicycle mileage record for 1900, with 38,887 miles. He has not missed riding a single day since the first day of last January, and his daily average has been a little over 106 miles.

Mr. Stannard to-day received official notification that he had established a new record from the Century Wheel Club of America. His nearest competitor is L. Laekler of Camden, N. J., who was 600 miles behind him. Belcher of Brooklyn is third man, with 28,000 miles.

The greater part of Mr. Stannard's riding was done in the course of his business which takes him all over the city and out into the country. Sundays however, he put in as many miles as possible, always without pacemakers.

When he started out to break the record he weighed 239 pounds; at midnight, December 31, he weighed 297 pounds. He will continue to ride for the rest of the winter, gradually reducing the number of miles each day, until he feels that it is safe to quit altogether. The total distance he has covered is equivalent to a little more than 1 1/2 times around the world.

His record by months was as follows: January, 2137; February, 2271; March, 2311; April, 2819; May, 3154; June, 3119; July, 3297; August, 3412; September, 3719; October, 4174; November, 5005; December, 2993. His best day's work was October 21 with 181 miles.
