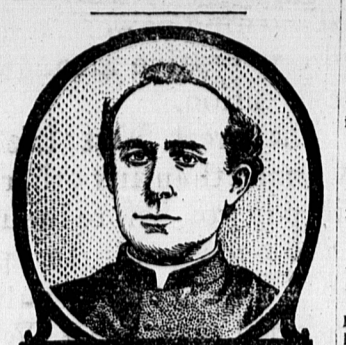

HIS LABOR OF LOVE



Father Morrissey, the Bartibogue Priest and Physician, Won't Take No Pay For His Treatment.

Father Morrissey's remarkable success for he became famous from Atlantic to Pacific—was due partly to his wonderful power of diagnosis. He was born with a doctor's eye, and the sick man's face was to him an open book.

To this he added a rare skill in medicine. His prescriptions made up chiefly from herbs and balsams, proved so effective in curing almost every kind of common ailment that they were in great demand long before his death.

Father Morrissey gave his time and skill freely to all whatever their creed or position in life. They came to him from far and near—even from Vancouver and the Western States. And for his services he always positively refused to accept a cent. The good deeds themselves were to him sufficient reward.

Since his death a number of gentlemen who were friends of Father Morrissey have formed a company to continue making up the prescriptions which he used with much success. 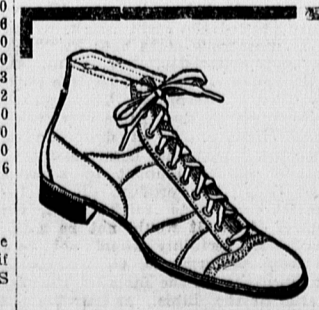
