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ENG. RESENTS EGYPTIAN TANGLE TO LEAGUE

SITUATION IN EGYPT NOW MUCH EASIER

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Nov. 26.—Field Marshal Viscount Allenby, High Commissioner in Egypt, informed the British government in a message today that the situation in Egypt was much easier, a result of the respite since the resignation of the Egyptian government. The possibility of serious riots in Cairo and other centres he said, was greatly reduced. Allenby it was stated in official quarters believes the Zawal Pasha Cabinet will accept the remaining British demands or open direct negotiations with Great Britain for the settlement of the difficulties existing between the governments.

IBANEZ TRIES TO SPREAD PAMPHLETS

Will Use Airplanes if Necessary to Get Manifesto INTO SPAIN

Printing of Spanish Edition of the Pamphlets, About 200,000 Copies.

(Special to the Guardian) PARIS, Nov. 26.—An army of volunteer smugglers is now engaged in attempting to get copies of the pamphlet written by Vicente Blasco Ibañez in denunciation of King Alfonso and Premier Rivera, across the Spanish frontier, the author said yesterday. The printing of the Spanish edition of the pamphlet—about 2,000,000 copies—was finished Saturday night but up to yesterday Ibañez was uncertain whether a single copy had crossed the Pyrenees. Nevertheless, he affirms that an attempt will be made soon to distribute the pamphlets by airplane. The author declared he had been assisted by the generous offers of help which had been made to him since the announcement of the pamphlets publication.

Regarding the plans for his projected Spanish republic, the novelist declared it would be inspired by the example of the French revolution. "But the only thing socialist we would do," he declared, "would be to expropriate the great land holdings of the nobles and give to each peasant sufficient land for filling purposes instead of permitting the vast tracts to be used for pasturage of wild bulls destined for the bull ring. You know a wild bull covers a lot of territory, and he must have plenty of leeway to remain wild enough for fighting. That and is perfectly capable of the cultivation of crops which would sustain life."

GOVT. AND OPPOSITION PARTIES EQUALIZED

(Canadian Press) OTTAWA, Ont., Nov. 26.—The capture of West Hasting by the Liberals will result in exactly equalizing the government and opposition parties in the House of Commons. The body consists of 116 Liberals, 62 Progressives, 51 Conservatives, 2 Labor and 2 Independents. There is a vacancy in Temiscouata and counting that seat Liberals, the government will have 117 in the House the same number as all other parties combined.

SHOCKING DOUBLE MURDER IN N. BRUNSWICK YESTERDAY

Two Children Aged Ten and Fourteen Found With Rifle Shots Through Their Heads—Half Brother of Girls' Mother In Whose Cabin Victims Were Found, Arrested.

(Canadian Press) FREDERICTON, Nov. 26.—The first double murder in the annals of York County which fortunately is usually free of capital crimes, is reported today from Fosterville on the international boundary line between Canada and United States. Cynthia Foster, aged 14 and her younger sister, Olivia, aged 10, were found with rifle shots through their heads about 11 o'clock last night in a camp on the shore of North Lake.

Ward Foster, father of the two girls made the gruesome discovery of the two girls' bodies in a camp which was the home of Harry G. Williams, half brother of the girls' mother. One body was on a bed in the cabin, and the other was on the floor under the bed. An alarm was given and an armed posse started to scour the woods and at noon today word was received here that Williams had been placed under arrest near the scene of the crime. Sheriff Hawthorne and Deputy Sheriff Saunders have gone to Fosterville to bring Williams to York County Jail here.

NEWSY WIRE BRIEFS

Flashed In At A Late Hour

(Canadian Press) CAIRO, Egypt, Nov. 26.—The entire Cairo brigade of British troops again paraded the streets of the European and native quarters with fixed bayonets today. GENEVA, Nov. 26.—Hon. Dr. Baland, Canadian Minister of Soldiers' Civil Re-establishment and delegate from the Dominion to the Geneva Opium Conference, was yesterday elected chairman of the committee dealing with the manufacture and sale of narcotics. WASHINGTON, Nov. 26.—Secretary of state concluded today a tripartite agreement with the Australian and Hungarian Governments under which war claims arising since July 31, 1914 will be adjusted.

Nfld. Steamer Is Refloated

JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 26.—The Newfoundland Government steamer Prospero, which ran ashore yesterday on Green Island and was refloated last night and reached St. John's this evening under her own steam, considerably damaged under her forehold and with water entering the engine room. Arrangements were being made to dock the steamer at once for repairs.

SAILORS MISSING

Egyptian People Have As Much Right to Govern Themselves as any other Nation, Says Indpt. Labor

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Nov. 26.—The statement issued by the British Independent Labor party on the subject of the present crisis between Great Britain and Egypt is as follows: "The Independent Labor party views with deep humiliation the actions of the present British Government in Egypt. It draws urgent attention to the fact that this policy of renewed suppression is due to the false belief that Great Britain has the moral right to occupy Egypt, although she has pledged on over 50 separate occasions to terminate the occupation and formally recognized her independent sovereignty in 1922. "The occupation of Egypt was originally due to strategic financial reasons. It has no greater moral sanction than the German occupation of Belgium for strategic military purposes. The Egyptian people have as much right to govern themselves as any other nation. The occupation of Egypt by an alien power is the basic fact in the present situation which no subsequent reason of strategy or financial interest should obscure.

IRREGULARITIES

WRECKAGE PLANE FOUND; OCCUPANTS MISSING

(Canadian Press) SACKET HARBOR, N. Y., Nov. 26.—Wreckage of the plane in which Pilot Carl Groby and Harry D. Conne of Ogdensburg, left that city Sunday afternoon and for which a search has been conducted, was washed ashore near Little Sandy, seven miles north of the Big Sandy Life Saving Station late today. No trace of the men was found by a life guard who discovered the wreckage.

EGYPTIAN PREMIER MAKES STATEMENT

(Canadian Press) CAIRO, Nov. 26.—Ziwar Pasha, new Premier of Egypt promised today to reach an agreement with England regarding the Nile. "Foreigners have nothing to fear. They will be protected. The new government is resolved to maintain order, we are sufficiently strong enough to do so, and we will do our duty."

IRISH LABOR UNIONS CAUSE EXCITEMENT

DUBLIN, Nov. 26.—The rivalry between the Irish Transport Workers Union and the new Irish Workers Union, founded by James Larkin, when he was ousted from the former organization, again caused trouble in Dublin last night. The Larkinites, defying police orders, posted pickets before various motion picture theatres, endeavoring to engineer a strike. Enormous crowds gathered making entrance to the cinemas difficult. The police, finding themselves unable to cope with the crowds at two points, were ordered to fire their revolvers in the air as a warning. One gathering stood its ground but the other broke and fled. The excitement lasted until a late hour.

MCEACHERN HAS "THE GOODS" SAYS ROSS

Sees in Islander Makings of Future N. H. L. Star

WILL HOLD HIM

May be Used This Winter—Roy Prowse With Boston Hockey Club

BOSTON, Nov. 25.—Art Ross, manager and vice-president of the Boston Bruins, the latest addition to the National Hockey League, is a wise old boy. The Boston professionals have been working out here for two weeks, with a daily squad of twelve and sometimes more. Ross' one big move was the signing of "Wackey" McEachern, well-known as "down East" as a speedster on the Charlottetown Abbies. Ross saw in McEachern the makings of a future star, and tendered him a contract. But Ross does not intend to play "Wackey" in early season, using the amateur Maples as a "farm." Ross intends to have McEachern under his eye right here in Boston. The professional manager will be able to use McEachern in case any of the regulars are injured, and the Islander will at the same time retain his amateur standing. Playing with Maples in league games and practicing under Ross' careful coaching daily McEachern will have unheard of opportunity to develop.

Two other Maritime players, Roy Prowse, Charlottetown, and Aubrey Wheaton, Moncton, brought here by Ross, are showing up well. It is understood that B. A. A. A. and Boston Hockey Club are after the "down Easters" when Ross lets them out as the Bruins intend to carry twelve men only.

Boston's club is made up of former Ontario amateurs and Pacific Coast League players. Of the amateurs, Nat, Carson Cooper, Hamilton Tiger ace, appears to be going the best. Bobby Rowe, Floyd Cooke, defense, and Alf Skinner, forward, are from the Coast. They are tried veterans and should make the grade. "Hack" Povey, the goalie, is also from the coast. Frank Patrick, owner of the Vancouver club, and former team-mate of Ross' on the old Montreal Wanderers, is responsible for the Coast players' arrival in Boston. He wants to help Ross and parted with some of his best men to do the favor.

Other players with Ross are, Herberts, Mitchell and Schuare, Ontario stars, and "Snooky" Harris from the West. Healey, a veteran player is also with the Boston club. Art Ross is a believer in discipline and drives men hard. Workouts are held daily, and the squad is not allowed to slow up. Ross works every player hard and if any shows signs of freshness, he sends the player out to get a sweat on. The early sessions of the Bruins training did not see Ross scrimping his men; that came later. He sent them out to do a lot of skating and shooting, side against side coming only this week.

While the officials at the big rink here did not have any intention of shortening the ice area, such was done when Ross arrived in town. He saw in the 220 by 100 a small lake, much larger than the average Canadian rink. The change of the ice space made room for 500 extra box seats.
