Possessed of an upright and Christian character he made many friends, he was hospitable, and always ready to assist his neighbors in time of sickness or trouble.

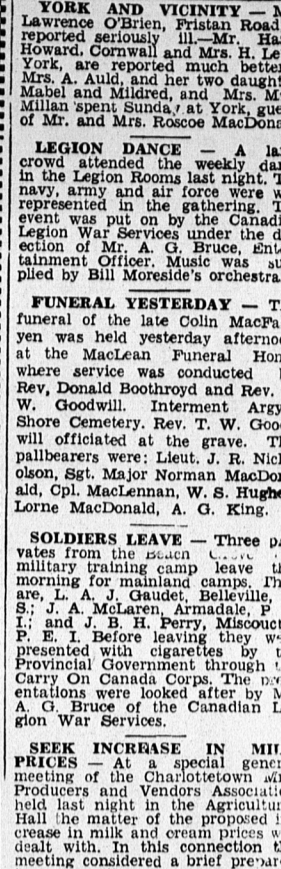
