

TALES TOLD BY MEN IN THE FIGHTING LINES ON LAND AND ON SEA

ing obstructions, and the extraordinary dexterity the Commander-in-Chief has shown in getting us out of a hole will no doubt win for him an imperishable name in the annals of the Empire. General Chetwode simply worships Sir John French, and so does every man serving under his command, from drummer-boy to general division. In war we all know excesses occur and mistakes are made. In this campaign the Red Cross wagons are deliberately fired upon, ambulances shelled, doctors and medical aid marked out for destruction by the deliberate orders of the German generals in command. But you can take my solemn assurance that the Germans will never forget the lessons they learnt at Mons. It has not been my privilege to share in a cavalry charge, because I was at least three miles to the north of the battle, but I did have the honor of assisting in digging trenches for the dead, and every man we laid in his grave bore the marks of bravery. Many gallant men were gripping their swords as the stars and moon lit up the littered field of death, and men shed tears as they counted up the terrible toll of that splendid achievement, which will add lustre to the glories of British arms for all time.

SIX STREETS OF WIDOWS.

Private J. Atkinson, Duke of Wellington's Regiment, who is now in hospital in Birmingham, says in a letter to his wife at Leeds:—

It is not war. It is murder. The Germans are murdering our wounded as fast as they come across them. I gave myself up for done, as we were in the thick of the fight at Mons. Our regiment started fighting with 1,009, and finished up with 106 and 3 officers; so we just lost 900. It was cruel. At one place we were at, called Amiens, where all the women were left widows, and were all wearing widow's weeds. The French regiment that fought there was made up in the town and they got wiped out. Our colonel got wounded, and then the Germans

attacked him and cut his throat.

ESCAPED FROM THE GERMANS.

Trooper Beak, of the 4th Dragoon Guards, writing home to his wife at Crewe, gives an exciting story of his escape from the Germans. After describing his journey from England he says:—

I went straight to the front in the firing line, and within two hours of being there had three horses shot under me. The last one was a Uhlan's and that caused all the trouble. That went down when I was in the midst of them, and I got made prisoner along with Sergeant-Major H— of ours. We did not think we should ever see England again, as just before dusk on Wednesday afternoon they made us strip every mortal stitch off our bodies so that we could not escape. At the time they were being hardly pressed by our troops. But in the middle of the night we made a cut for it, and got away. I have one consolation, and that is that I killed two Uhlans and wounded one before they captured me, and Sergeant-Major H— claims he killed half-a-dozen. I broke my sword clean in half when I was and I reckon I have had a good birthday present by having my skin saved whole, and am glad to say I can still put the following words, "I am still alive and well."

ONE BULLET'S CAREER.

Sergeant E. W. Turner (Royal West Kent Regiment), writing to his fiancée said: The bullet that wounded me went into one breast pocket and came out of the other and passed through your photo, making a hole in the breast. What a strange coincidence. It then passed through my watch and struck a large clasp knife, smashing it to pieces and driving it through my pocket.

Lord Amthill, for the English Grand Lodge, Expresses Appreciation

LONDON, Sept. 29.—Lord Amthill pro Grand Master of the Masonic order in England, sends the following message regarding the Queen's Canadian military hospital proposal:— "The generous, patriotic undertaking of Canada Lodge and the Canadian Freemasons adds greatly to my pride in the attitude of the craft. It does, however, not surprise me. I know well the spirit of Canadian Masonry. The effort of Freemasons must, of course, be mainly directed towards relief at the present time, since that is in accordance with our traditions. Canada Lodge has set a fine example and forged another link in the chain of Empire. "AMPTHILL."

Canadian Freemasons in England are throwing themselves with enthusiasm into the project which their official head thus commends. The practical nature of the proposal to establish a base hospital in London with an auxiliary hospital near Folkestone, under the name of the Queen's Canadian Military Hospital, is especially gratifying to His Majesty's Government.

Canada Lodge here has given a first subscription of \$5,000, and confidence is expressed that every Mason throughout the Dominion will answer the appeal now being made to subscribe one dollar per head.

BELGIAN ADVANCE ON BRUSSELS.

LONDON, Sept. 30.—A despatch from Amsterdam says that refugees arrived there from Ghent in the middle of the night, and are in contact with the Germans.

ZEPPELINS MAKE WAR ON CHILDREN.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—The operators of a German Zeppelin dirigible dropped a bomb into a school house at Bielefeld, Russia, killing eleven children according to a despatch from Petrograd to the Morning Post.

GERMAN CONGO TAKEN BY FRENCH

PARIS, Sept. 29.—"It is officially announced that the French forces in equatorial Africa have re-occupied the greater part of the Congo territory ceded to Germany by the treaty of 1911," says the Bordeaux correspondent of the Havas Agency.

GENEROUS HOSPITALITY.

LONDON, Sept. 29.—Britain has come to the relief of stricken Belgian refugees with such spontaneous magnanimity that refugees are forced to decline flood of offers of shelter. The authority for this statement is Lord Gladstone, former Governor-General of South Africa, who is now a leader in the committee work.

BURGOMASTER ARRESTED.

LONDON, Sept. 30.—The following official despatch has been received wireless from Berlin:—"The German Military Governor of Brussels has announced the arrest of Burgomaster Max by public poster as follows:—"I have found myself obliged to suspend Burgomaster Max from his office on account of his irreconcilable attitude. He is now in honourable custody in a fortress."

BERLIN HAS NO NEWS.

BERLIN, Sept. 30.—No official news from the western battle-ground has been received since last night. News papers have not been informed by their correspondents regarding the great general engagement which is progressing, and details are not known here. The Archduke Frederick of the Austrian forces, in army orders today declared that a new and great victory was imminent in the western camp of the Germans, according to despatches received here from Vienna.
